The vicious and misleading article in the Times-Independent upon the senior editor of this paper has caused considerable comment about town, in a manner not at all complimentary to the Times editor. After having first come at us with his personal abuse he then gets so indignant as to lose his self-respect, and abandoning all reasonable argument seeks to smooth over his own misgivings by wilfully and maliciously prevaricating.

Regarding his statement that we came over to his office at the request of Mr. St. John to see what could be done about pooling on the county printing, it is correct so far as he goes. We did go over there and at Mr. St. John's request, but Mr. Brown deliberately withheld a part of our conversation. He said, "I told him (Benschoter) that I intended to go it alone," but the wilful prevaricator did not add his exact words to that sentence which he said to us in private conversation, that "the populist party was kicking so much about it that he had concluded not to pool any more." No, Mr. Brown did not want his readers to know that the party was being held over him and that he was being horse whipped into the party harness, but rather he seeks to falsely hold out the impression that he has reformed. He did not in that misleading article of last week tell you that during our private conversation regarding county printing that we positively stated to him that we did not care whether we pooled or not but that we wanted to give Mr. St. John an answer so he would know what to expect.

Now the fact is that the pooling on county printing was first done in this county at the instance of Mr. Brown, and that during all these years when he has been howling against trusts and combines and pretending to be working to the interest of the "poor tax payers." We have been a party to this pool for three reasons: First, because Brown wanted us to, second because we wanted to, and third, because the populist party was then and is now in absolute control, thus making it sure that we get a portion of the county work which would likely revert to the party organ. Last year we were awarded the county printing with the exceptions of the delinquent tax list, our bid being the lowest on the whole job, tax list included. But the tax list, the fattest on the job, was singled out and given to Brown.

He says, "Good bye, my once friend George." We are still his friend only the fool don't know it.

He further said: "With the commencement of the year 1899 we will ignore your attacks upon us and will combat our paper in the interest of Loup City, Sherman county and the masses of the people." Thus driven to these desperate straights by the party last he has at last acknowledged that his pretended reform during all these years has been sham and only surface deep and has at last seemingly pledged himself to take up the true cudgel of reform.

A Carlist uprising in Spain is liable, from present indication, to occur at any time. Don Carlos, it is claimed, has an army of 100,000 enlisted in his cause, his leaders are in every town and hamlet, and they have plenty of arms and ammunition concealed in handy places to supply them. So thoroughly is the country permeated with Carlistism that the government is powerless to quell the agitation. Don Carlos is said to be a man of no very great genius, but is firm in his belief that the throne of Spain belongs to him. He was once a pretender for the Throne of France, but being an ardent Catholic surrendered those convictions at the suggestion of the pope. But in the case of Spain the holy pontiff, appears to be silent. On account of his former pretensions in France, that country, it is expected will oppose his ascension to the throne of Spain, for if he is successful he would undoubtedly favor the Orleansists of France, and a probable overthrow of the French republic would follow, hence there is a possibility that France would cross the Pyrenees with her army if it became necessary to do so to maintain Alphonism in Spain. But the European embroglio is always fomenting but very little seems to come of it.
