SUPERVISORS PROCEEDINGS
 Loup City, January 16th, 1899.
 The county board of supervisors met this 10 day of January 1899 as by law provided.
 S. N. Sweetland was chosen as temporary chairman.
 The following parties presented and filed with the county clerk their certificates of election as supervisors:
 O. L. Way Dist. No. 1; S. N. Sweetland, dist. No. 3; W. G. Dietrichs, dist. No. 5; A. Dickerson dist. No. 7; whereupon the above named gentlemen were upon motion declared entitled to seats.
 S. N. Sweetland was elected permanent chairman and the organization of the new board declared.
 The bids for county printing were examined and awarded as follows:
 Articles enumerated in lot one to Omaha Printing Co; lot two, comprising stationery printing to R. A. Brown, lot 3, which included official ballot printing and bar tickets, also the printing of all legal notes, treasurer's financial statement, treasurer's delinquent tax list and supervisors proceedings to Henshaw & Gilson.
 County board adjourned.
 Loup City, January 11, 1899.
 Supervisors in session; full board present, also T. S. Nightingale, county attorney and John Minkoff, county clerk.
 Chairman reports his appointment of the following committees:
 On Finance - Dietrichs, Way, Beckthold.
 On Claims - Dickerson, Leininger, McKinnon, McDonald, Dietrichs, Dickerson.
 On Bridge - Leininger, Beckthold, Way.
 The county clerk is instructed to cause advertisement to be published, asking bridge contractors for sealed bids, said notice appears elsewhere in this paper.
 On motion salary of county superintendent for 1899 was fixed at \$100.00 and it was ordered that the same room now occupied by the

intendant be rented for his office at the rent of \$15.00 per annum.
 The item of \$5.00 poll tax against Wilhelm Thode was ordered stricken from the tax list.
 On motion the county attorney, T. S. Nightingale, is allowed \$5.00 per month for office rent and three tons of coal for year 1899.
 N. J. Nightingale, as attorney for W. H. Chapin, Felix Eckhout, Lawrence P. Nissen, John Greenhugh and Henry Lewis, sureties in the Peoples State Bank for the county deposit, plead with the county board for a compromise of the judgment rendered against said sureties upon said depository bond and proposed to the board that the county settle with them for \$500.00. Aron wall and J. S. Pedler plead for sureties also.
 On motion the sum offered was rejected, it being considered too low, the amount of judgment being \$1012.75 with \$30.00 costs. Board adjourned to Jan. 12, 1899.
 Loup City, January 12, 1899.
 Board in session, present all members, county attorney and county clerk.
 The sureties in the case of Sherman county vs. the Peoples State Bank again appeared before the board and expressed their desire for a compromise of the judgment. It was on motion of Dickerson, ordered by the board in the month of the levy made by H. G. Patton, sheriff under an execution issued in the above said case, upon certain personal property of the said sureties. That the said sheriff, in consideration of the sum of \$500.00 paid by said sureties he is hereby ordered to release the levy upon all of said personal property of said sureties so levied upon, but that the said sheriff shall retain the levy made by him upon the land known as the Adolph Kausse & forty; and that T. S. Nightingale county attorney is also instructed to appear in the action now pending in the district court via, County of Sherman vs. A. T. Nichols, et al. and on behalf of Sherman county to consent to the setting aside of the

sale had in said last named action of the Lawrence P. Nissen lands, and it is resolved by the county board and agree to by said board and said sureties all of whom were present, that if the said sureties do pay to the county clerk of the district court, upon the said judgment rendered upon said depository bond against them, the further sum of \$500.00 on or before the first day of December, 1899, if by that time confirmations have not been yet had for the sale of the lands had in the above named cause, entitled County of Sherman vs. A.  The following official bonds were approved: George B. Work, Treasurer of Scott township; Hugo Hugo, overseer of dist. 30.
 The soldiers relief commission presented its

report which was ordered filed. James Rantrow was reappointed as member of said commission.
 The committee on finance made report on the fee book of county treasurer listing the statement of fees collected to be correct and in sum total \$1,746.00, which report was accepted and approved.
 Committee on finance examined sheriff's fee book and reported same correct. Total fees collected \$1,355.92. Said report was approved by this board.
 The committee on finance examined and made report on fee book of county judge. Total fees \$234.05. The same being correct was on motion approved.
 Board made estimate of county expenses for the year 1899, a notice of which appears elsewhere in this paper.
