Commenting upon the evident determination of Democratic leaders to keep free silver at the front in campaign of this fall and in 1900, the New York World remarks that in 1896 the Democratic party was beaten 603, 514 on the popular vote, and 95 in the electoral college, and since then has lost four states, with 21 electoral votes, and gained only Kentucky, which is likely to be lost again this year.

The traffic with these Asiatic countries to day amounts to \$1,000,000, 000 annually and it is the opinion of our consuls there that America can control the greater part by energetically going after it. Senator Lindsey, a democrat from Kentucky, said the other day in a speech that, "American dominion in the Philippines will disregard no one of the inalienable rights of man; will sanctify no abuse or usurpation, but will terminate the despotism under which these people have lived for more than 300 years. In submitting to the authority of the United States they surrender no privilege or immunity." In ten years statistics show that our trade with the orient, in bread stuff has increased 1,600 per cent, and it is not likely that the farmer will be willing to relinquish any advantage over a trade that promises so well for the future, by voting a democrat or populist ticket, either party which seems never to have a good word to say for our foreign policy, if they once understand the benefits coming their way from these countries.
