**SULLIVAN KNOCKED OUT.**

Sherman County's Clerk Decides Against Him.

**LAWYER SAYS NOMINATION WAS FRAUDULENT.**

The following is a letter written by R. J. Nightingale, a lawyer of this city, and who tried the contest case against Homer M. Sullivan, before the County Clerk of Sherman county. Mr. Nightingale gives all the facts in the case and compliments the clerk in his own language. That the decision was a just one there is no doubt, but that by reason of it he is entitled to the vote of all good citizens, there is a question. The Republicans have, in Mr. Stevens, a candidate for clerk who is just as efficient and who would undoubtedly render as fair decisions in matters of this kind as did Mr. Minshull, and the fact that circumstances, and justice forced him to set aside this glaring fraud is no great point in his favor. The following is Mr. Nightingale's:

**AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PUBLIC.**

Justice requires that something be said in vindication of the County Clerk of Sherman county, since it has come to light that the Populist clerk of Custer county has rendered a decision which is the very opposite of our clerk's decision upon the same state of facts in relation to the right of Judge Sullivan to have his name printed on the ballot as a Democratic nominee for judge. That our clerk, in doing Judge Sullivan a place on the ballot as a Democratic nominee, has made a righteous judgment and the other clerk has been misled by partisan prejudice or some other cause, let the public be the judge. The evidence is all on file in our clerk's office and any lawyer or any citizen can examine it for himself.

The evidence on behalf of the protestant, consisted of the testimony of eight good democrats, two populists and one republican, and was amply sufficient to justify the clerk's finding of facts and his decision. But the testimony offered by Judge Sullivan's counsel was even more convincing. The Judge's court Reporter, C. H. Scott, was called on behalf of Judge Sullivan and testified, among other things, that the call for the so-called democratic convention which nominated Judge Sullivan was made by the Reporter's own brother as secretary of the judicial committee and another gentleman as chairman. That these two members of the committee never consulted the four other members of the committee about calling a judicial convention, but arrogated to themselves the power and authority of the entire committee. Their call was therefore an absolute fraud upon the democratic judicial committee and upon the whole body of democrats in this judicial district. The notice of the holding of the convention was published in only one newspaper, which was a Populist organ and was published, circulated and read in only one county in the judicial district and was published only once to wit: on Oct. 29th, and the convention was held on Oct. 6th. The court reporter further testified that the regular judicial convention was held on August 18, 1899, and adjourned without day after refusing to make a nomination for judge. The court reporter brought up from Kearney, some 8 or 10 democrats and Judge Sullivan, came down from Broken Bow, with some 8 or 10 more, and these gentlemen all met together at Ravenna, and with great liberality dispensed with the production of credentials and invited one democrat who happened to be, very innocently present from Dawson county and another democrat from Sherman county to take part in these proceedings. The Sherman county man says he was not authorized in any manner by the democrats of this county to represent them at that convention, and that the Sherman county convention refused to endorse Judge Sullivan. These 16 or 18 democrats who were thus met together without any legal right to represent their brother democrats in the judicial district, made the nomination, which was there and then accepted by Judge Sullivan, evidently with full knowledge of the facts. I submit that under the rulings of our supreme court our county clerk was in duty bound to make a finding, that this nomination was illegal. In State vs Smith, our Supreme Court rendered a decision on Dec. 8th, 1898, in which they held that a nomination to a public office was invalid where previous notice of the time and place of the meeting of the committee had been given to all the members and only a part of the committee had made the nomination. The same principle as to notice applies in this case. The County Clerk only found that the nomination was invalid. If a judge or jury had tried the case the evidence would have supported a finding that the nomination was fraudulent. Mr. Minshull is a sincere and a strong Populist and he had a very unpleasant duty to discharge when he decided that a judge who belonged to his own party had no legal right to a democratic nomination. Mr. Minshull conquered all political bias and showed himself to be an honest man. As one of the lawyers who helped to try the case before him, he has my profound respect and I know he is entitled to the respect of all of his fellow citizens. A populist who would even look askance at him, much less one who would vote against him because his uprightness of character has risen superior to prejudice of every kind, would deserve the condemnation of all honest citizens of every party. It is to be regretted that Judge Sullivan has placed himself and his party in this undesirable position. His act will not defeat the county ticket in this county but it may do so in other counties. It will certainly drive the Democratic voters of this district away from him as a candidate. What the result will be as to his populist friends the election alone will determine. One little crumb of comfort our people are getting out of this unpleasant affair, they believe that the Sherman county officer is head and shoulders above the Custer county officer in intelligence or honesty or in both.

**IN A FATAL DAZE.**

The following is the account of the death of the father of Judge Wall of this place, as taken from the Evening Press, of Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Edward Wall, an old resident of the vicinity of Shelbyville, was instantly killed this morning, (Oct. 19, 1899,) at the railway cross just south of Shelbyville, by the G. R. & L. passenger train, which was due here at 9:10. The old gentleman, who was known for years at Shelbyville by the name of "Teddy" Wall, was nearly 83 years of age, and the fatality was probably due to his mature years and consequent feebleness.

The G. R. & L. train this morning consisted of only two coaches, a passenger coach and a combination smoker and baggage car, and was in charge of Conductor Stewart and Engineer Cotthrell. The victim of the accident was evidently attempting to cross the track as the train approached, and heard the whistle just as he was in the middle of the tracks. He appeared dazed, and stood still. The engineer made an effort to stop the train, but the effort was vain and before the old man had recovered his presence of mind he was struck and killed.

There were but four passengers on the train. One of these, a traveling representative of a tobacco house, spoke to the Press this afternoon in reference to the affair as follows:

"I heard the whistle blow and then the train began to stop suddenly. We knew there was something wrong, and the four of us who were in the car hurried out. We saw a bleeding body hanging from the machinery at one side of the engine. I went up to it, and found the face was covered by the body and it fell to the ground. The body was completely off. I loosened the body and it fell to the ground. I saw it was that of a gray haired old man I nearly fainted. He was dead then."

Mr. Wall resided in the vicinity of Shelbyville for forty years past. He owned a farm near there, but of late had been residing with his daughter, Mrs. Florence Herbert, just south of Shelbyville. His body, upon identification, was removed to an undertaking establishment at Martin, three miles from the scene of the accident. His grandson stated this afternoon that the funeral would be held Sunday.
