Official Paper Sherman County

Major John A. Logan was killed in battle in the Philippines last Sunday, while gallantly leading his men into a charge at San Jacinto. He was the son of Gen. John A. Logan the great fighter of the rebellion.

A. R. Alphin has severed his connection with the Arcadia Champion and it comes to our desk last week as neat and newsworthy as ever under the new management of S. A. Morrison. Mr. Alphin was a pleasant caller Monday.

The U. S. volunteers that have been sent to the Philippines, have been heard from and their fighting is not second to the regulars. They are cornering Bryans friend very fast and his chances for success are about as good as our windy statesmans will be if put up in 1900.

Judge Kinkaid, as usual, carried his own judicial district but the pep majority in the southern tier of counties in the congressional district was too great to overcome. Neville lost his own county, which was carried by the populist ticket by a good majority.

The Times says that Jacob Albers, G. H. Gibson, and Lewis Bechtold will be the standard bearers of the republican party in Sherman county next year. Well thanks. The people of Loup say they elected Jake because he always sees that they have good roads. In Loup City twp., they claim Lewis is invincible, and as for you and myself I can only quote your man, Neville, when he said that the republicans had run Kinkaid against him before and he defeated him therefore he could not see why in thunder they were foolish enough to do it again.

It is a noticable fact that the republican ticket was voted blank for Supreme Judge to a considerable extent in almost every railroad town in the state. In Omaha over 900 of such ballots were cast without the head of the ticket being supported, in Lincoln over 400 of such ballots were cast, at Loup City seven or eight republican ballots with the head blank were cast, and such reports are coming from all the railroad towns. This is evidence on the face of the returns that Holcomb's election is due to the support of railroad and other monied corporations.

A populist said to us two days after election that he was ready to take up arms against the government at any time. He said, "I fought in the cause of the Union during the rebellion, but am to-day sorry for it and wish I had went into the southern army." Was he right or wrong? How many populists in Sherman county will join him in what seems to be his honest convictions. We hope not many. Let those who will not sit down and soliloquize a moment. This man is illiterate. It is said that he cannot write his own name. If you believe he is right continue to instruct him at your shrines. If you think otherwise just ask yourself whose teachings it was that makes this man curse the land that gave him birth. Has the state of Nebraska been any better off during the reign of populism than under a republican administration? Can you obtain money easier? Has your bank account grown larger? Can you hold your grain, stock, and other products of the farm longer? Are you not enabled to pay interest and principal easier and is not your garraers better filled? If this

be true you may be justified in standing by your party so far as continuing them in power goes, but are your leaders justified in poisoning the minds of the common people to the point of anarchy and riot is the question. We ask all thinking men if this country has not advanced phenomenally during the past forty years, and if you conclude it has turn over the pages of history and see whose hand it was that guided the ship of state during that period of intense growth. Was not the only crisis experienced in all that time during the reign of democracy from '92 to '96, and did not the commercial sky brighten at once upon the success of the Republican party? People it is your right to be populists if you so elect, but it is no mans right to incite the masses against a government which you all acknowledge is the best on earth today. Because a man says another is a thief does not make it so and when you are told that all that is vile in this world belongs to the republican party, just ask yourself if your neighbor who belongs to that party, comes as near living up to the ten commandments as the other fellow does. Go a little further and convince yourself what party it was that paid off two billion dollars of a war debt in 25 years, and then had the humiliation of seeing the other party step in and increase our debt two hundred sixty-four million dollars in four years. Remember that a first class liar in a community can ruin the reputation of the best man in it, and also that you never yet seen a place that did not have some fellows in it whose greed for office so blinded them that to gain it they would destroy the life and happiness of any man or the welfare of their own people. Remember the greatest robber has always been the first to cry thief.
