NEIGHBOR.

Your Ashton correspondent seems rather to commiserate the undersigned that he has so long "considered" in the matter of building a creamery at that place. Now we would like to say for the information of our many patrons in the vicinity of Ashton that the Ravenna Creamery Company has always endeavored to do business in a business way and we never feel justified in branching out and entering new fields in the creamery business till we are financially able to do so without passing the hat around, or crowding the farmers into putting up the funds for us.

We can see no reason why the creamery business is not as legitimate and proper a business as the mercantile business, milling or any other branch of industry, nor why the farmers should be required to furnish the capital for some outside corporation to come in and do business with them. In our judgment no state in the Union possesses more or better natural advantages for the dairy industry, and legitimate creamery business than does Nebraska; nor has any industry in any state advanced more or been more retarded in its development than have these in this state from the operations of creamery promoters and smooth tongued schemers who have worked the farmers to a finish in all sorts of ways whenever they could get a hearing, but always in their own profit, and the final loss and disgust to the farmer, and to the great detriment of the whole dairy industry.

Of course there are always creameries for sale cheap after a brief experience with these people, but the after results of the expense always go with the property, and it is always much more difficult to re-establish a business of this kind than to establish it rightly in the start.
