

I have for one year been discussing imperialism such an extension of the nation's limits as would not change the character of the government, and an expansion which converts a homogeneous republic into a heterogeneous empire. I believe that all people are capable of governing themselves and that the Filipinos should be allowed to govern themselves, but I do not think they are sufficiently advanced to share with us in the government of the nation. I am not willing to admit them as citizens and do not believe that a republic can have subjects, therefore I want this nation to give them independence and then protect them from outside interference. 
