Mr. Stanley kindly told him that it was cheap twine the people wanted and a reduction in price would be very acceptable. Had our pop state officers emulated this wise course, instead of hunting a Republican buy a hog to scare the people with, our farmers could laugh at the twine trust and enjoy cheap twine as well as the farmers of Kansas.

Wanted Home

Another patient sufferer has been called to the reward. Friday morning, April 13, 1900 at 1:15 o'clock Mrs. Chas. F. Beushausen after a very brief illness passed away at her home in the Ashton, Neb.

Though she had been a sufferer for many years, it was not thought that she was any worse or that her condition was alarming, in fact Thursday afternoon she drove to town on an errand, took a walk to be in the air, and when she returned she was unable to get on her feet, where she performed her household duties before retiring. She complained of nothing more or less than being fatigued after her day's exertions. At about midnight she became ill, and friends were called in to be physician sent for.

All that was done to relieve her but all efforts were in vain, she lingered till shortly after 1:00 o'clock when her spirit floated away to that land where all is rest and joy before those in attendance could realize that her soul had taken its flight. The cause of her sudden taking away was heart trouble.

Blanch Loe Paige Beushausen, only daughter of Ebr. Paige and Annie Grennawalt Paige was born on December 14th, 1873 at Savannah, Butler county Nebraska, and was at the time of her death, 26 years 4 mo. and 20 days old. In her early girlhood she with her parents moved to Sherman county, Nebraska, where she received a Public and High school education, and later attended college at Lincoln, Neb. and at Stramsburg, Neb. She then taught several successful terms of school in this county when her health failed her and she went to Colorado and spent a year with her brothers, Charles and Frank, where her health improved considerably. Returning to Nebraska she was married to Charles F. Beushausen on October 4th, 1899 at the home of her parents near Ashton, Neb.

She united with the the Congregational church in her early youth and has ever since been a worthy, conscientious christian, in fact just a few hours prior to her death she knelt in prayer before retiring to her bed for the last time. Wherever she went she won legions of friends and departing this life she left no enemies, but to know her was to love and respect her. She was ever an obedient and loving daughter, a kind, true and affectionate wife, a bride of six months and a martyr to great pain and suffering, yet ever patient and cheerful.

The funeral services were held at the Ashton Presbyterian church Sunday, April 15, 1900 at 2:00 p. m. They were conducted by Rev. Hampry of Farwell and Rev. Witter of North Loup. The text, so befitting the occasion, was John 13, 7, "What I do thou knowest not now, but in the future thou shall know." The remains were interred in the Ashton Union cemetery and as she was laid to rest amid Easter lilies, the words of Christ concerning the first Easter morn comes to us anew, "I go to prepare a place for you, that where I am thou shalt be also." She leaves us in the early spring time, called home to her eternal rest.
