The world will witness some fighting in the Transvaal ere many days that will cause the pro Boer element to cease John Bull because he has learned to fight.

Uncle Sam's patience is exhausted and the Sultan of Turkey will be called upon to pay up or fight. It has been nearly five years since the outrages for which indemnity is demanded were committed, and it is high time that payment was made.

The Hon. Frank H. Jones, who has been New Hampshire's most distinguished and influential democrat, having come to the conclusion that the Democracy's attack of Bryanism is incurable, has moved into the Republican party, bag and baggage.

The friendliness exhibited by Great Britain towards the United States during our unpopularity with Spain continues in its full vigor, and her expressed sentiments as to our little wrangle with Turkey are bristling with good words for Uncle Sam.

In the last two calendar years, under the Dingley tariff, we bought from Europe goods worth \$725,000,000. In the same two years we sold to Europe goods worth \$1,940,000,000. The balance of trade in our favor was thus \$1,215,000,000 from Europe alone. This is the sort of "revengeful foreign alliance" that is caused by the republican policy of protection. It is entangling to the other fellow.

We are in receipt of a copy of the Baldwin Primer, published by the American Book Company. It is an ideal book and fully up to the standard of the Baldwin Readers which are, without doubt, the best set of readers on the market. The text matter has been prepared by a master hand, which makes it a book worthy of commendation and of use. In the scheme of the book the child is made a part of the lesson, and thus becomes familiar, not only with words and sentences, but with common things around him which they represent, and his various faculties are guided, cultivated, and thus educated from the very first lesson. A thorough perusal of the contents of the Baldwin primer will impress one with the idea that it is the best beginner's book ever published.

The training school system inaugurated by the Burlington for its shopmen, engineers and firemen is proving a wonderful success. Afternoon meetings are held at the principal division points once a month, and there is a round table discussion of the best methods of work. The newer men unconsciously absorb the experience of the older ones, and all gain some knowledge from points brought out in discussion. A recent suggestion of one fireman has caused the adoption of a new style of oil cut, with the result that two plants of oil go nearly as far as five plants formerly did. The work now planned through the training school system is another illustration of the fact that Burlington men constitute a force of men, thoroughly drilled, and all pulling the same way.

The "True Populists" of this state are now coming before the people at a rate like that of a three minute race swinging into the home stretch with D. Clem Deaver as their announcing agent. They have set up base keeping for themselves and have a newspaper in full blast. Just how numerous they are may be better ascertained by watching their state convention which will convene at Grand Island on the 27th day of June, 1900. They claim to be the Simon pure stuff and indicate that

common pops may allow democrats to cover them with saliva and gulp them down without even taking time to pin their ears back, but the genuine "true populist" is out for blood, and to swallow him is a task that even the subterranean cavern in Billy Bryan's head is unequal to. Their representative spent last Wednesday night in Loup City and, it is said, met with considerable encouragement. As offices in the corrupt old pop party will not go round as fast as desired therefore defections must be expected. Just how many of the present faithful in this ball-awick will go off after the new god cannot now be ascertained but there are some who must find a new hole to crawl into soon or be stricken with epilepsy.

The ticket as talked of at present by the leading Republicans of the state is Hon. G. M. Lambertson of Lincoln, for Governor and Hon. A. E. Cady of St. Paul for Lieutenant Governor. The NORTHWESTERN believes that the Republican candidate for governor should be selected from the central or western part of the state and therefore would much rather see Mr. Cady at the head of the ticket. If the convention decides to place Mr. Lambertson at the head it would certainly be an excellent choice. Both men are of great platform ability and can make a campaign that would be a credit to the party. When Mr. Cady ran for congress in the Sixth district he made one of the most able and brilliant campaigns ever made in the state. Mr. Lambertson is a deep thinker, a fluent talker and wherever he goes commands respect and draws large crowds. They are two of the cleverest and ablest men in the state. We say reverse the order, and give us Cady and Lambertson.

Congress is contemplating the submitting of a constitutional amendment to the people which will give them full power in handling the trust question. The Republican party is the only factor in law making that ever did attempt to relieve the people from the trust outrage and when they make up their mind as to the best way to handle this great aggregation of capital, the country will have no need of any farther fears as to its being done. The McKinley law, the greatest ever put upon the statutes of the United States, for the regulation of trusts was scarcely born until a democratic congress, almost dominated by W. J. Bryan, murdered it and laid it to rest, and not because they thought it bad, but simply to place upon our statutes a democratic free trade law, with all its pernicious frills. McKinley said that capital combining to restrict trade and injure labor should be subject to a fine of many thousands of dollars and imprisonment as well. Wilson and Bryan thought that neither should be done when their law was framed. Yet now, that perfect piece of presidential timber makes daily meals off the "trust octopus."
