(Ordinance No. 59.)
An ordinance relative to levying a tax on
the taxable property, both real and personal,
of the village of Loup City, Nebraska, to
provide for the necessary expenses of the
said village for the fiscal year 1900, etc.
Be it ordained by the chairman and board
of trustees of the said village of Loup City,
Nebraska:
Section 1. That there be and is hereby
levied on the taxable property, both real and
personal, within the village of Loup City,
Nebraska for the various funds herein named,
the tax after such respective funds, to-wit:
General fund 10 mills.
Water fund 10 mills.
Street fund 2 mills.
Bond Sinking fund 20 mills.
Interest water bond fund 23 mills.
