Minutes of Supervisors Meeting.

MEMBERS OF BOARD: Chairman, W. C. Dieterich, Dist. No. 5. Dist. No. 1, Anton Kwiatkowski.

Loup City, Nebr., January 8th, 1901 County Board met this day pursuant to law and on motion W. C. Dieterich was chosen temporary chairman.

The following named persons presented their certificates of election: Anton Kwiatkowski, supervisor district No. 1; D. L. Richardson, supervisor district No. 3; W. C. Dieterich supervisor district No. 5; John F. Roberts district No. 7, and the county judge J. A. Angier, having filed certificate showing that the above named supervisors had filed their official bonds, and that the same had been duly approved by him, it was moved that the said parties be seated as supervisors of Sherman county.

It was moved and seconded that an informal ballot be taken for permanent chairman—carried.

On the informal ballot, W. C. Dieterich received six votes for chairman and on motion the informal ballot was declared formal and Mr. Dieterich was declared chairman for 1901.

Minutes of the last meeting was on motion approved.

The bond of E. H. Robinson as clerk of Hazard township was on motion approved.

The bids of Omaha Printing Co., State Journal Co., Revere Printing Co., Fremont Tribune, E. A. Brown and Benschoter & Gibson were then opened by the Board.

Board adjourned to 9 o'clock, a. m. the following day.

Board met pursuant to adjournment this 9th day of January, 1901, all members being present.

The chairman of the Board reported the following committees for the year 1901:

Bridges:—Boecking, Bechthold, Richardson.

Roads:—Thode, Roberts, Kwiatkowski.

Finance:—Bechthold, Kwiatkowski, Richardson.

Claims:—Boecking, Thode, Roberts.

On motion the contract for furnishing supplies as advertised for in lot 1, was awarded to the Fremont Tribune for the year 1901.

The contract for printing legal blanks etc., designated as Lot 2, was on motion awarded to E. A. Brown.

Lot 3, was awarded to Benschoter and Gibson.

On motion the bids on printing delinquent tax list, treasurers financial statement, road, bridge and legal notices as filed by E. A. Brown and Benschoter & Gibson were rejected.

On motion Supervisor Thode is authorized to reshingle the roof of the dwelling house on the poor farm.

The finance committee reported having examined the report of the county Superintendent and recommend the same to be approved, being found correct, as follows:

The names of sixty persons possessing the qualifications of jurors were then drawn by the Board to serve at the next jury term of District Court.

The offer of S. S. Porter for rent of rooms, for sheriff and superintendent as follows: "Dr. S. S. Porter offers to rent the suit of rooms for the use of the county Superintendent of Public Institution and Sheriff for the ensuing year on the present terms, to-wit:—\$75.00 per year payable semi-annually for the three rooms. Dated this 1st day of January, 1901. S. S. Porter by V. M. Porter, per N. his attorney." Was on motion accepted.

On motion the salary of the county Superintendent was fixed at the sum of \$700.00 for the year 1901.

The request of County Attorney for office rent, and fuel, was allowed at \$5.00 per month for office rent and three tons of coal per annum for 1901.

By request the county clerk is allowed a deputy and one or more assistants when needed and their salaries fixed at the sum of \$700.00 per annum and \$45.00 per month respectively.

The following report of the Soldiers Relief Commission was on motion accepted:

State of Nebraska, Sherman County, s. s. To the Hon. The County Board of Supervisors of said county, The soldiers relief commission of said county respectfully reports as follows, to-wit: Since our last annual report made January 3, 1900 we have expended no money. There is now in the hands of the county treasurer the sum of \$146.73. Moon's term expires at this session of the Board, Loup City, Nebr. Jan. 5th 1901. Geo. W. Hunter, Chairman. Walter Moon, Secretary.

On motion Walter Moon was appointed a member of the soldier's relief commission for the term of three years.

The salary of the County Attorney was on motion allowed at \$350.00 for the

year 1901 as by statute provided. Board adjourned to 9 a. m. January 10th, 1901.

Jan 10th 1901, Board in session as per adjournment.

The official bond of Walter Moon as member of the soldiers relief commission for three years was on motion approved.

The estimate of expenses was made for the year 1901, [same is in another column.]

Official bond of Herbert Baker, as justice of the peace of Elm township was on motion approved, as was also bond of Anton Waskowski.

The bonds of E. A. Brown and Benschoter & Gibson for printing approved.

On motion the clerk is instructed to advertise for bids for contract for building of bridges for ensuing year.

Bonds of J. P. Leininger as clerk of Washington township, and Wenzel Rewolinski J. P. of Oak Creek were approved.

The following claims were allowed, deductions for taxes being made and the clerk is ordered to draw warrants on the respective funds, to-wit:
