One of the two saloons recently purchased of Cal. Sprague closed business last Tuesday morning. This move was brought about by reason of the fact of Mr. Sprague having discharged his two bar tenders, John Chelowski and Frank Lorchick and substituting others in their places. Mr. Chelowski is the man who sold his business to Mr. Sprague and at the time was retained as bar tender. He does not consider his bondsmen responsible for any of Sprague's acts, and having filed papers to that effect with the village board leaves Sprague without even a shadow of a license or bond under which to operate, at least so far as the one saloon is concerned. It is also rumored that steps will be taken to close the other saloon now being operated by Mr. Sprague, as it is being run without bond or license issued to him, but under the mere shadow of a license issued last May to Erney Milburn. Upon this question people have different ideas. In the first place it is in direct violation of the law to run a saloon without bond or license issued to the party operating it. In the second place, speaking from a business point of view Mr. Sprague could not be expected to invest his money without, at least, taking due precaution to protect such investment. And then again, morally speaking, (that is to say if there is any morality in such a business,) should the people stand by and allow a saloon to be conducted contrary to law. These are questions now agitating the minds of our citizens, and while some manifest a desire to see Mr. Sprague bridge the difficulty without loosing so large a sum of money, yet they do not want to be recognized as having given their sanction to a method of doing business in open violation of law. The Village board at their regular meeting last night were called upon to take some action in the matter.

Is it Small pox? Robert Young a young man of this city arrived home from a ramble through the south last Friday evening with what some claimed to be a fairly developed case of varioloid, while others, as usual, claim it is not. Mr. Young says that he was discharged from a hospital at McCallister, I. T. Ave days before arriving home, as being well of a case of fever, and that the eruptions on his face, the doctors told him were caused by the great amount of quinine he had taken. Mr. Young arrived on the 5 p. m. train and by advise immediately went to his home by a back street and had Mr. A. B. Outhouse, who came on the same train from Lincoln, send Dr. Main to see him. Upon the doctors return from the examination he said that he did not think it was small pox. Mr. Young came down town immediately after his interview with the doctor and mingled with the people, stating the doctor told him he did not have small pox. Everybody became suspicious and the next morning the mayor sent Dr. Jones, who is an aged practitioner to examine into the case and he pronounced it a case of varioloid. The home of Mr. Young was at once quarantined and all public meetings stopped. Every precaution was taken to prevent any spread of the disease, if it is small pox, and a reasonable degree of safety is being experienced. Yet there are nervous ones, who will not be at rest until the limit, without developing the disease after exposure is past. Mr. Young put in his time the first day of the quarantine in cutting wood in the back yard, and says he has not felt so well for a long time.
