The Farmers Institute opened last Friday afternoon at Society hall, but owing to unfavorable weather there was not as large an attendance as was expected. A deep interest was manifested by all present, however, and much good resulted from the meeting. Dr. A. T. Peters, E. V. Forel, G. H. Marshall and L. D. Stillson of the state Agricultural experiment station were present and each handled their various subjects with convincing argument.

The first subject taken up was "The Prevention of Animal Diseases," by Dr. Peters, L. N. Smith presiding. Mr. Peters thoroughly demonstrated the fact that there was no such thing as cora stak disease, but that the cause of so much loss among cattle was due to eating poisonous weeds, commonly known as wild par-nip or water hemlock and deadly nightshade. These two weeds seem to be growing all through the cornfields. Disease of hogs was also taken up and explained at length as also was that of other animals.

The Friday evening meeting was called to order by E. E. Tracy and the principal feature of the evening was the stereopticon lecture. The lecture delivered by Mr. Forel, on the Nebraska Agricultural school was highly interesting and instructing. He informed the people that it was not necessary for a scholar to be a graduate of a high school to enter that institution as was the case at the university, and that there was at this time 137 scholars in attendance though the school was but three years old.

A meeting was held Saturday forenoon and also in the afternoon with Carsten Truelsen as presiding officer.

At the close of the institute a county institute was organized by electing Carsten Truelsen as President; Elias Ogle Vice President; L. N. Smith, Secretary and W. R. Mellor assistant Secretary. R. D. Hendrickson and C. J. Tracy were selected as a committee on arrangements for the next meeting which is to be held in the afternoon of the first Saturday in April. It is thought that it will be profitable to hold such meetings about once a month, at which time the farmers will have an opportunity to get together and compare notes and thereby gather knowledge of the great industry of farming and stock-raising.
