Andrew Carnegie has divided \$5,000,000 of stock in the new gigantic steel trust among the old employes of his works. This is another mark of Mr. Carnegie's benevolent spirit and will make a number of the men stockholders in the concern and thereby give them an interest that could be gained in no other way.

They are now collecting the rays of the sun by the aid of Mirrors in the deserts of California and applying it to the heating of boilers to make steam for stationary engines for pumping at irrigating plants. By this means the desert will be turned into productive farms as the water lays near the surface and the expense of pumping it will be very light.

Associate dispatches say that England and Russia have finally faced

each other with troops at Tien Tsin over the title of a small piece of land granted by China for railroad purposes, and each only awaits orders from their government to resist and plunge the two countries into a war or back down and leave the few acres to the other. S. senator has ever yet been allowed to take his seat where the appointment was made from the reason of a legislative failure to elect, Mat Quay, of Pennsylvania was refused a seat under just such circumstances as would exist if our legislature failed to elect and no doubt Mr. Quay wields more influence with the senate than both of our would be senators.
