Something New in Geysers

Tourists to the Yellowstone National Park next season will be attracted to a brand new attraction in a wonderful geyser. A man named James King who has been living in the Park during the past winter, has just informed the Helena Record that in the early morning of Feb. 18 he was awakened by a terrific explosion of a large quantity of powder. He soon discovered that the Fountain geyser basin had given birth to a new geyser.

The new wonder is located about 200 feet immediately south of the famous Fountain geyser. At the time of Mr. King's discovery and for along time thereafter, it was sending a solid column of hot water gushing forth from a subterranean hole about five feet in diameter with a loud roar. For an hour and a half the monster column of hot water shot heavenward. It then subsided and has since been playing at regular intervals of about two hours.

Singularly enough the Excelsior geyser, the largest, and in some respects the most wonderful geyser in the Park, which has not been in a state of eruption for several years past, commenced to play on Washington's birthday, and continued in full play for five hours.
