TO TEACHERS.
 Under the new law governing admission to the "State Normal School" at Peru, the following conditions must be complied with.

1. The applicant must be fourteen years of age, of good moral character, and of good physical health.
 2. An applicant who holds either (a) a valid teacher's certificate or first or second grade from any county or city of Nebraska or (b) a diploma of graduation from a Nebraska high school of at least two full years work above the eighth grade may be admitted without examination.
 3. An applicant who does not hold one of the documents enumerated in paragraph 2 but who possesses the qualifications stipulated in paragraph 1, may be admitted upon passing a creditable examination in the following subjects: orthography, reading, writing, geography, history of the United States, arithmetic, physiology, English composition, and English grammar.
 4. Applicants from other states may be admitted upon the same conditions as those residing in the state, subject to such tuition charges as may be prescribed by the Board of Education.
 5. Graduates from secondary schools that have been accredited as "preparing full for the first year of university work" by the University of Nebraska will be admitted without examination to the two years' course for high school graduates.
 6. Applicants possessing qualifications stipulated in paragraph 5, may be admitted to the two year kindergarten course without examination.
 7. Application for advanced standing will be granted only at the discretion of the faculty upon approved credentials or examination.
- Examination for this purpose may be taken at county superintendents' office on any regular examination day which is the 3rd Saturday in each month.
