## THE EDITOR FILES FOR REPRESENTATIVE

On the last day for filing for nomination for the various offices before the primary election, and in the absence of any other nominee for the office on the republican side, the editor of the Northwestern placed himself in nomination for representative of this 57th district. He is willing to admit that he filed for the office simply because he wanted to do so and wished to represent the people of Sherman county in coming legislature. For all the years he has been a publisher of republican newspapers, he has been a hewer of wood and a drawer of water for the republican party, and has never asked, nor would accept nomination for any office whatsoever. In fact, he has never contracted the habit till now that he has succumbed to the fever and become one of the hunters. Among the regular announcements will be found his card asking for the office of representative at your hands. If elected, he will honestly and faithfully represent the people of Sherman county to the best of his ability. It is up to you.

Bro. Dan Webster of the St. Paul Phonograph has drawn the fire of a broadcast from the typewriter of Col. John G. Maher, one of the numerous democratic candidates for governor, in which the colonel devotes about a column of "hot stuff" about the great apostle of peace and watchful waiting, brought out by Dan's scoring of the colonel for his attitude to the great idol and three times candidate for president. Our brother of the sound waves at St. Paul evidently is unacquainted with the ability of John G. to construct English language to suit occasions and we opine will hardly be able to cope with the doughty colonel, who can unlimber broadsides like a gatlin gun and just about as effective, especially when he has the ammunition, as he is at present provided with. Better hunt the tall timber, Dan, before John G. gets his gatlin in working action. We've known him for years, before he had descended to the depths as democratic candidate for governor, and you will need a regiment to help you make him retreat or surrender, and then lose out, probably.

A bill in congress to reduce the mileage of congressmen and senators from 20 cents per mile to 5 cents per mile has just been defeated in both houses. That's good democratic doctrine from a democratic congress. At the present rate of mileage allowance, a Pacific coast member, living say 3,000 miles from Washington draws \$600 from the U. S. treasury, about five times as much as the regular fare would cost, and which it does cost congressman as well as common folks. The difference makes a pretty penny of graft to the members. Just think of it, 20 cents per mile each way between home and Washington. And as long as that is the law, can you name one—of either party—who would refuse to take it or put it back?

Score one good mark for Bryan. The great commoner and "watchful waiting" premier of the Wilson cabinet, is out in a formal statement of his attitude on woman suffrage. He declares he would ask no political rights for himself that he was not willing to accord his wife, hence he would record his vote in Nebraska this fall in support of the constitutional amendment granting the franchise to women. For once, at least, the writer has a commendable word for Wilson's political master. Wonder how Bryan's attitude will strike the president, who refuses to commit himself on the question?

And now even the newest political party has been discovered in fraudulently padding registration in California. We expect this and all other awfulness from republicans and democrats, but aren't the progressives progressing wrong powerfully early in history?

The "Food Number" of the London Times, issued June 8, 1914, in its leading editorial states that eight years ago imports of chilled and frozen meat from the United States were valued at over \$25,000,000. In 1912 imports of this product has shrunk to \$75,000.

Quoting from the editorial: "This is by far the most striking change that is at present taking place in the food trade conditions of the world. It means that the once great export meat trade of the United States is now practically non-existent and that unless the Americans take steps to increase their home production of this staple article of food they will not only cease to export but will become to an increasing extent rival buyers in the markets of the world with ourselves and other nations. We are also threatened with the same menace in the egg trade by the United States and Germany, both of which, instead of being able to supply their own demand for eggs, are now buying for Denmark and Russia and other countries from whom we have hitherto derived supplies."

England's concern about its meat supply should further awaken farmers, stock raisers and Government authorities to the fact that they will soon have to face a similar condition of affairs in this country.
