Wm. Larsen was made happy last week by a few days' visit from his good father, Hans Larsen of Aurora, who returned home Saturday.

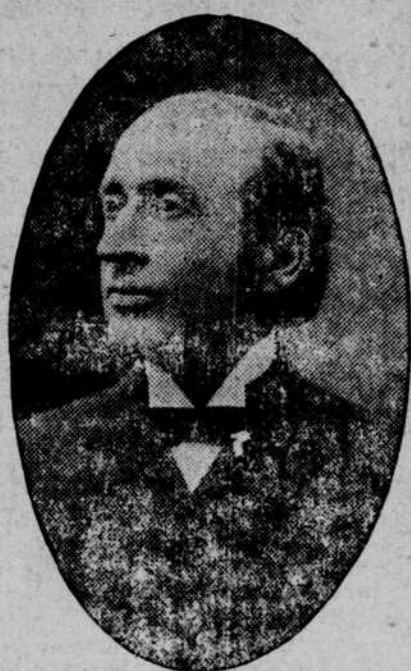
