LAW GOES INTO EFFECT.

The emergency war tax bill to raise \$100,000,000 in revenue went into full effect, Monday November 30. The provisions of the measure levying taxes on tobacco, beer and wine went into effect on November 1, and the remaining sections become effective tomorrow. The latter include taxes on bankers, pawnbrokers, including motion picture houses, owners of circuses and other shows perfume, cosmetics, chewing gum and similar articles; commercial paper of all description, steamship tickets, parlor car seats and sleeping car berths and telephone business, and every man who and telegraph messages where the charge exceeds 15 cents.
