offices the men you wish honored; BE IT ENACTED BY THE For Mayor-Dr. W. T. Chase PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA.

> Section 1. Section 143 of Chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Duties of county board. It shall be the duty of the county board of each county:

First-To cause to be annually levied and collected taxes authorized by law for county purposes, The usual "wet" and "dry", not exceeding one dollar and fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, unless authorized by a vote of the people of the county.

Second-To erect or otherwise provide a suitable court house, jail, and other necessary county buildings, and for that purpose to borrow money and issue the bonds of the county to pay the same, to keep the said buildings in repair and to provide suitable rooms and J.
