## A Ford Every 16 Seconds In April.

The production of 46,510 Ford cars in the 26 eight-hour working days of April, means a new car about every 16 seconds. Of course, this is a new record even for the Ford Motor Company. But the remarkable feature of this splendid manufacturing achievement is the fact that each car that came out of the assembly lines of the factory and assembling plants at intervals of 16 seconds and glided away under its own power was made, in the minutest detail, with all the infinite care and perfect design and the laboriously tested materials which the Ford progressive efficiency alone has made possible. While it requires about two months to build a Ford car the special equipment and methods assembled a complete Ford car as above stated, one every 16 seconds.

The Grand Island company which is developing the Boelus water power project is buying up all the electric light franchises it can get in the smaller towns and cities in this part of the state, or failing in that, contracting to furnish the "juice" for a term of years. Wood River and Cairo have already signed up with the Grand Island company, and negotiations are now pending at Shelton, where the electric plant is municipally owned. Negotiations are also pending for the purchase of the Gibbon plant. It is understood that the Grand Island company has made some investigations looking to the purchase of the Ravenna plant, or entering into a contract to furnish current for the system, but without results so far, we believe. — Ravenna News.
