Mrs. N. C. Foy passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Robert Parrish, last night after an illness of fifteen years, during the last twelve of which she has been a very great sufferer. Mrs. Foy, nee Rosa F. Hardman, was born in Weset, Virginia, Gilmer county, on September 27, 1856. She came to Nebraska in 1877 and was married to N. C. Foy, at Osceola, February 18, 1880. Mr. Foy homesteaded in Polk county after the war, he having served under an Iowa enlistment. Three sons and four daughters blessed the union and all of them are living and were at the mother's bedside at the time of her departure. They are: John W., of Loup City; George C., of Grand Island; Ross E., of Ord; Mrs. Mary Black, Mrs. Blanch M. Parrish, and Mrs. Jane Galbraith, and Miss Stella R. Foy, all of this city, and five grand-children. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, from the First Baptist church, the Rev. W. L. Fowle officiating. Take Care of the Baby.

Summer weather is hard on the baby. Proper food will prevent many deaths. Mother's milk is the only perfect food for a baby. Clean, fresh, cow's milk, properly modified and pasteurized is the best substitute. To pasteurize milk, place the bottles containing the milk in a double boiler, put in a thermometer and heat until the water is 150 degrees. Then push the boiler to the back of the stove and keep the temperature between 140 and 150 degrees for thirty minutes. This kills all the germs. If you have no thermometer, heat until the water around the bottles comes to a boil, then let stand for thirty minutes. Bottle milk should be diluted with boiled water, and cooled boiled water given freely between feedings. Clothing in summer should be light, and the baby kept out of doors as much as possible, except when it is very hot. He should be bathed morning and evening, and on hot days, in the middle of the day. If diarrhoea appears, the baby's food should be diluted with boiled water, and the amount much decreased. If there is vomiting and fever, stop all food, giving only boiled water, and call a physician.
