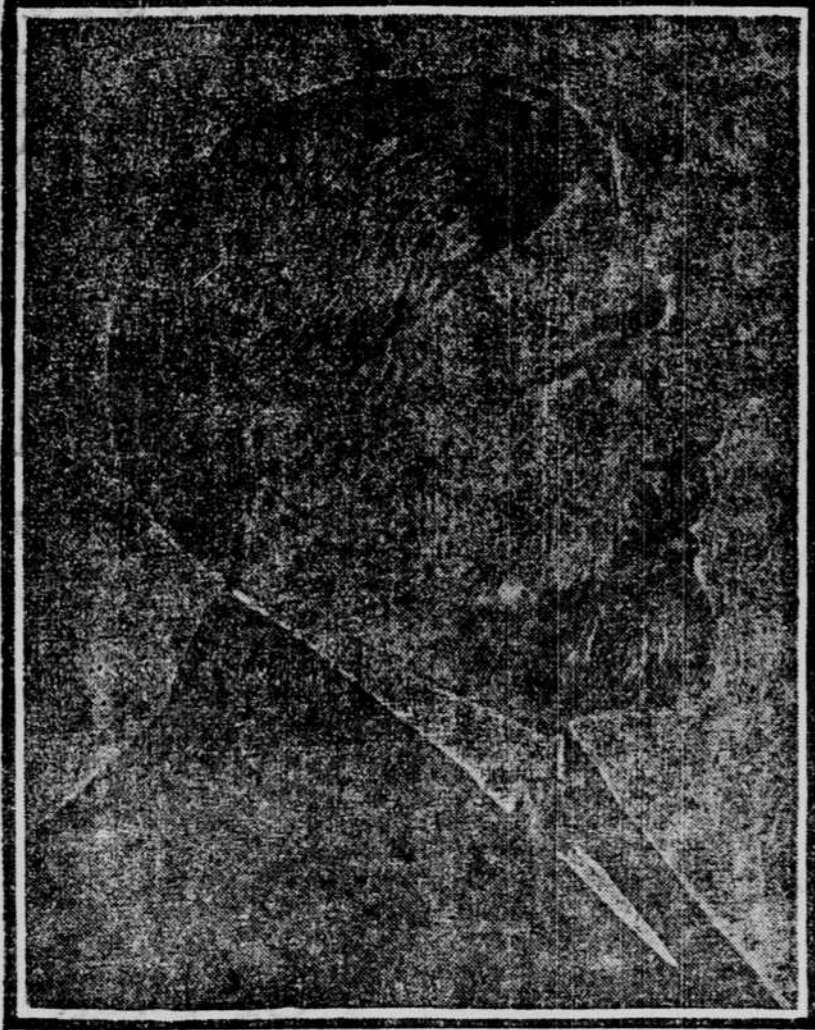

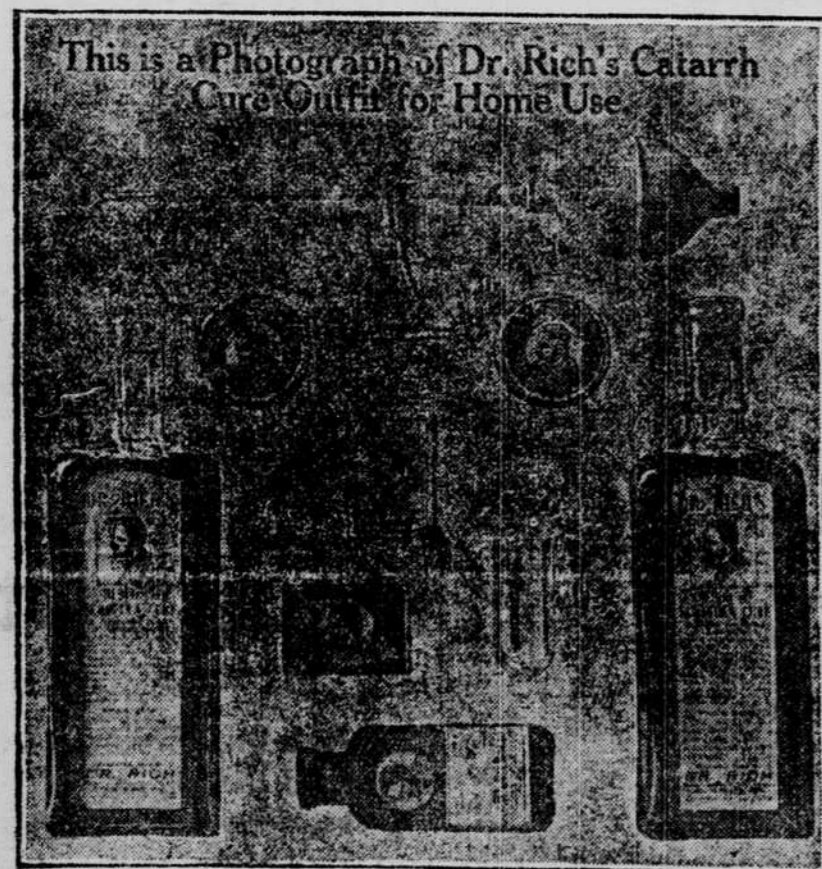

NEWS NOTES OF INTEREST FROM VARIOUS SECTIONS.

ALL SUBJECTS TOUCHED UPON

Religious, Social, Agricultural, Political and Other Matters Given Due Consideration.

Albion is soon to have its third bank. Corn around Dickens is turning out much better than expected.

"Uncle Jake" Wolfe of Lincoln, well known throughout the state, is said to be dangerously ill at his home.

The First National bank of Grand Island is to be re-organized, becoming a much larger institution than heretofore.

At the Casbers' public sale in Gage county four head of horses sold for \$766, an average of over \$191 per head, while six cows sold for from \$35 to \$45 each.

William Mason, the 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Mason, living west of Tecumseh, was kicked in the head by a horse and terribly injured. His skull was crushed.

Sheriff Ehlers has offered a reward of \$200 for the apprehension of David Horner, who broke jail at Osceola. The sheriff and his deputies are on the go most of the time to catch the fellow.

While burning rubbish, Miss Sophie Muelich, a well known young woman of Schuyler, had her dress catch fire. She was badly burned on her arms and body. Her dress was almost completely burned off her back.

William Esser and John Cunneht killed a large gray wolf at the edge of Nebraska City. This is the first that has been seen around there for some time. It was as large as a Newfoundland dog.

Salem Lutheran church at Fremont is to have a new pipe organ in the near future. It will be a handsome instrument that will cost \$1,050 at the factory at Burlington, Ia. It will have 552 speaking pipes and nine stops. George C. Boyer, who killed Herman Perley near Bayard last August by striking him over the head with a tamping bar, was sentenced by Judge H. M. Grimes to the penitentiary for three years. A motion for a new trial was denied.

William Meinsner, aged 20, was scalded by boiling beet juice at the sugar factory in Grand Island. He was employed at the carbonation tanks, one of which boiled over, throwing the fluid about his hands and limbs. Recovery, however, is expected.

A fire in the hay meadows on the Manville farm, three miles east of Fremont, destroyed nine stacks of hay belonging to Egberg & Thornbald. The flames are thought to have originated from the embers of a fire that had been burning on the roadway.

Salma Stevens, the 11-year-old daughter of R. Stevens of Beatrice, received a serious wound in the foot by the accidental discharge of a 22-caliber rifle in the hands of her brother. The boy "didn't know it was loaded," and twice leveled the rifle at his sister and pulled the trigger before it was discharged.

This is the law on the length of legislative sessions: "Each session, except special sessions, shall not be less than sixty days. After the expiration of forty days of the session no bills or joint resolutions of the nature of bills shall be introduced, unless the governor shall by special message call the attention of the legislature to the necessity of passing a law on the subject matter embraced in the message, and the introduction of bills shall be restricted thereto."

Orville Harrington, arrested in York at the request of Chicago officers for a statutory crime committed in Chicago, was released after a habeas corpus proceeding in the county court. He was immediately re-arrested for being a fugitive from justice and had his hearing in the county court. He gave bond in the sum of \$500 pending the arrival of the Chicago officers to substantiate the charges against him and was released from jail.

The Merrick County Corn show held in Central City was a most successful affair, both from the standpoint of attendance and the quantity and quality of the exhibits. The exhibits were displayed in the academy of music, while the speaking and other exercises were held in the opera house. The prize list was well competed for, there being entries for about every item on the list, and in the corn department the competition was very spirited. The prize winners will be in Omaha at the National Corn Show.

The requisition issued by the governor of Wyoming for the return of Sid Scott from Lincoln to Gillette, Wyo., was honored. Scott is charged with criminal intimacy with his step daughter. His wife made the charge against him two years ago but did not institute proceedings till Scott left their home near Belle Fourche and came to Lincoln.

Prof. R. E. Hyatt, former superintendent of schools at Elk Creek, died in Auburn, New York, of tuberculosis. Thieves and home breakers have been very active in Grand Island of late.

Chester Davis of Valley has written an interesting letter from Magdalena bay, Mexico. Davis is a handman on the battleship North Dakota and in the letter he tells of the many interesting things he has already met with on his travels. The ship next goes south, stopping at South American ports.

The official canvass of the vote cast at the recent election shows that both of the amendments carried by the following vote: Judicial Amendment—For, 214,247; against, 16,271. School Fund Amendment—For, 213,200; against, 14,407.

American Money Spent in London. One writer calculates that Americans, this year, have spent \$7,500,000 in London. At one of the largest hotels, which has housed 6,500 Americans since March, the average bill has been \$250.

THE STRENGTH OF AN EAGLE

Weight the Bird Could Carry in Flight—His Strong Claws.

While I cannot give any positive proof of how much a bald eagle can carry, I should suppose that he could carry at least as much in proportion to his weight as a hawk or a horned owl. I have the recorded weight of a male bald eagle weighing 9 1/4

pounds and a female weighing 12 pounds.

A horned owl will weigh from four to five pounds, and I have several times known one to carry off a large house cat. One was a very large one, and the owner told me he could hear the cat cry as he was being carried off. Now, any one who will weigh a house cat will find it weighs 10 pounds.

I have seen a goshawk carry off a hen fully twice its own weight, and I have taken from a marsh hawk a very large chicken which would weigh more than twice what the hawk would. The marsh hawk is one of our weakest hawks, but he had carried this chicken over a quarter of a mile. My belief is that if a hawk or horned owl can carry more than twice its weight (and I know positively that they can), an eagle could, if occasion required, do as much in proportion to

his weight, which would be to carry 18 or 20 pounds.

Once, when an eagle, shot through the body by a rifle ball, lay on his back, I upended a long road skid and dropped it on him. Before it reached him he stretched up and caught it in his claws and held it up the length of his legs above him. I walked up on the skid and stood above him and he easily held me and the skid, which I should judge would weigh more than 20 pounds. I took pains to be

weighed the same day, and weighed 119 pounds. Put a stick in the claw of a wounded eagle, and let him grasp a small tree with the other and a man must be stronger than I ever was to take the stick from him.—Forest and Stream.
