HA, HA! OUCH!

The election in Sherman county Tuesday provided a number of surprises for our people, pleasant and unpleasant, as the ease might be, surprises, of course, to all but the ones who always after an election knew just how it would go. Being a comparative stranger to Sherman county politics, the present election has proved most appreciable to us of the surprising nature. The campaign has been unique, in that a three-cornered fight was on over the county clerkship, by Mr. Gibson's independent candidacy, and as might have been expected culminated in the defeat of the major portion of the Republican ticket. At this moment, as the smoke of the battle still hovers over the sanguinary field and the reverberation of the day's cannonading still sounds in our ears, or words to that effect, and every man has a correct solution of the matter, we confess inability along that line and give others full sway. The two Republicans who won out were Sheriff Williams, of course, with the big majority of 442, and M. H. Mead for county superintendent with a majority of 163. We have only time this week to give the total vote of each candidate, giving next week in tabulated form the official count. Here you have it:

For treasurer: Truelsen, rep., 653; Hiddleston, pop., 731; Hiddleston's majority, 78.

For county clerk: Mathewson, rep., 455; Bush-vosen, pop., 554; Gibson, ind., 396; Bush-vosen's plurality, 99.

For sheriff: Williams, rep., 917; Thrillkill, pop., 475; Williams' majority, 442.

For county judge: Hunter, rep., 611; Anzier, pop., 739; Anzier's majority, 125.

For superintendent: Mead, rep., 776; Nicolson, pop., 613; Mead's majority, 163.

Up to the hour of going to press we have received no further figures. The official count has not been made as the official returns from three townships are not yet in the clerk's hands.

It is impossible therefore to give any figures on the head of the ticket in this county, though we understand the county gives the republican state ticket a substantial majority.

Returns give Ohio over to Democracy by some 60,000. Pennsylvania is also said to have gone wrong. Tammany wins in New York and Jerome is laid out. Massachusetts and the Loup City township ticket are both saved to republicanism, though, hallelujah.

Reports from Howard county gives the pops everything.

Our friend, A. Sutton, is elected for sheriff in Valley county by 700 majority, with God only knows how many back precincts to hear from. That ought to make "Dad" Williams envious.

A matter we should have noticed some time since was the law enacted by the last legislature providing for the complete registration of births and deaths for sanitary and statistical purposes. The state board of health has appointed Dr. A. S. Main of Loup City as local registrar of these vital statistics for Loup City, Logan, Webster, Elm, Washington and probably Rockville townships. All deaths hereafter occurring in these townships must be reported to the doctor or one of his deputies and a permit for burial be obtained before the body is removed or buried. All births must also be reported to the doctor or one of his deputies within three days from the birth of the child. A penalty of not less than \$10 and not more than \$100, or an imprisonment not exceeding sixty days, or both fine and imprisonment may be brought to bear on any one failing to comply with said law, in the discretion of the court. It would be well for those interested to pay heed to the above.

Adjudged Insane.

Last Thursday, information was filed against one Frank Pilanowski, a Poland, living some 18 miles north-east of Loup City, in Oak Creek township charged with being of unsound mind, and in fact dangerously insane, the complainant being the wife of said Pilanowski. Sheriff Williams went out and brought in Pilanowski the same evening, and Thursday afternoon the case was brought before the board of insanity commissioners. Pilanowski resisted the insanity idea and employed Judge Wall, who was conceded a continuance till Wednesday morning of this week, in order that his client might be able to get witnesses in his behalf. Pilanowski, according to complainant, was violent and dangerous, beating his wife and children, breaking the furniture, tearing his clothes to shreds, refusing to gather his crops or allowing others to do so, threatening the life of wife and children and of neighbors who interfered, biting his stock and doing other flagrant acts. On the other hand, Pilanowski claimed it was all a scheme to have him declared insane that his property might be taken from him, etc. His family consists of wife and three children. The services of an interpreter were necessary, as but few of the witnesses, even understood the English language. On being brot before the board Wednesday, the commissioners adjudged Pilanowski insane, and Sheriff Williams took him to the hospital for insane at Norfolk today.

Wants to Marry to Suit Herself

On Monday of this week, Deputy Sheriff Draper brought a young girl named Annie Stenkie before Judge Anzier on complaint of her father, Frank Stenkie, for incorrigibility, and the case was continued for ten days. The girl, who claims to be 17 years of age, but whom her father claims to be only 15, it seemed wanted to marry a young man of her choice, to whom her father objected, and she left home, and was living with the family of her brother-in-law and refused to return to her home. She insists she would prefer going to the reform school to returning to the paternal roof. County Attorney Pedler did all he could to persuade the girl to return to her home and stop the trouble, and finally succeeded in getting her to return home with her father for at least the ten days in which the continuance was taken. The girl claims her parents want her to marry one of their choice, to which she demurs.
