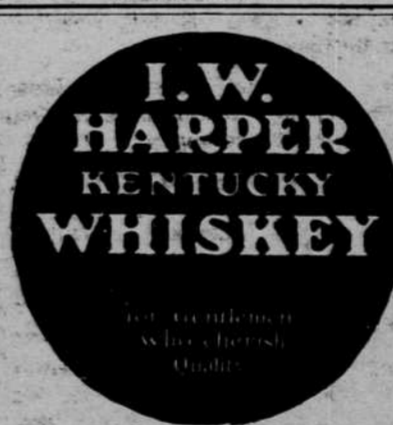
Notice of Sale of Land Under Order of Sale.
