A Big Business Deal.

Last Friday morning, the Loup City State Bank passed into the hands of a number of the leading business men and financiers of this city, Messrs. C. W. Fletcher, C. C. Hansen and T. J. Hansen, disposing of their holdings in the bank and property thereof to Messrs. E. G. Taylor, J. S. Pedler, C. C. Carlsen, W. R. Mellor, J. W. Long, S. N. Sweetland and a few other stockholders, whose names we have not learned. The new stockholders immediately selected the following official directory, and commenced business at once: President, E. G. Taylor; vice president, J. S. Pedler; cashier, C. C. Carlsen; directors, W. R. Mellor, J. W. Long and S. N. Sweetland. Messrs. Hansen and Fletcher have given us in their State Bank a good institution and greatly aided Loup City in erecting a fine two-story business block in which the same is located, and have made many friends among the business interests of our town and county, and we wish them success in whatever they may undertake in the future. In the change of the bank into the hands of some of our leading financiers, who have spent the best years of their lives in Loup City, the institution will take on new life and no doubt win new laurels in the realm of finance.

Wrestling Match.

About fifty men and boys attended the wrestling match at the opera house on Monday evening of this week, to witness Pat Cannon, the professional wrestler, throw three local wrestlers within an hour or loose his game. At the appointed time, Cannon, the professional, and Frank Papernick, appeared on dress parade, and in about ten seconds thereafter, Frank appeared in the air above the shoulders of Cannon and then reclosed gracefully on the mat provided. The next man to try conclusions with Cannon was Alvin Engle, whose broad shoulders and well developed muscles made him appear much to the advantage of Cannon, but after a short, but uneven tussle, Mr. Engle, though the best man physically, yet not on to the tricks of wrestling, was put down and out. But the third bout was a much better exhibition of the art, between the wrestler and Din Mulick, the contest lasting about twenty minutes, with the points in favor of Din from start to finish, with a good deal of speculation to the effect that if Din's wind would hold out, he might keep Cannon from winning, but after a hard struggle, Din concluded to yield rather than going through more than a half hour's further exhaustion, and gave up, though it was a mooted question with those present whether the local weight could not have won, if he had held out. At the close of the exhibition, M. C. Mulick offered to post anywhere, from one hundred to five hundred dollars that his son could best Cannon in a wrestling match, giving young Mulick three to six weeks of necessary training. Cannon offered to take the wager, but seemed over the referee's decisions, and used some harsh language, saying he would insist that the contest take place elsewhere, as he would wrestle no more in this man's town. Mulick agreed to let the match come off anywhere, but what the outcome will be we have not learned. The strength, agility and suppleness of young Mulick were a genuine surprise to his many friends, and should the proposed match between he and Cannon be arranged, Mulick will have a strong backing.
