## Articles of Incorporation, Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association

Know All Men By These Presents:

That we, C. M. Snyder, Chris Zwick, W. H. Hughes, Rola D. Hendrickson, J. B. Ford, James McBeth, A. W. Mason, John J. Zink, John N. Fisher, do associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the transaction of the business hereinafter described:

I. The name of the Corporation shall be the Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association.

The principal place of transacting its business shall be in the city of Loup City, county of Sherman and state of Nebraska.

II. The nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be:

1. To buy, sell, exchange, store and ship all kinds of grain and farm products, and to carry on and maintain a general grain business.

2. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in lumber, lime, coal and all kinds of lumber and building material.

3. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in coal and other fuel, and to carry on wholesale and retail coal yards and to do a general coal business.

4. To buy, sell, exchange and deal in animals and live stock of all kinds and to carry on and maintain stock yards and do a general stock shipping business.

5. To buy, sell, lease, rent, exchange, own, hold and deal in real estate as far as may be necessary, incidental or advantageous in conducting the above described forms of business.

6. Such business to be conducted at Loup City, Nebraska, and such other places in the United States as may be deemed expedient by the Board of Directors.

III. The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000), in shares of ten dollars (\$10) each, to be paid on demand of the Board of Directors.

IV. The existence of this Corporation shall commence on the 16th day of April, 1906, and continue during the period of twenty-five years unless sooner dissolved by law.

V. The business of said Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, not to exceed seven in number, to be elected by the stockholders, such elections to take place at such time and be conducted in such manner as shall be prescribed by the by-laws of said Corporation.

VI. The officers of said Corporation shall be a President, Vice President, secretary and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at the first regular meeting of the stockholders, and shall hold their office for the period of one year, and until their successors shall be elected and qualified.

VII. The highest amount of indebtedness to which said Corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than the paid up capital stock, and no fine except a farmer actually engaged in tilling the soil shall be eligible to hold any office in this association.

VIII. The manner of holding the meetings of the stockholders for the election of officers and the methods of conducting the business of the corporation shall be provided for in the by-laws adopted by the corporation.

IX. The highest number of shares that any person shall be allowed to subscribe for or own shall be fifty (50) and shall be allowed one vote only as though he owned but one share.

X. No shareholder of this Corporation shall be individually liable for more than double his share of stock subscribed.

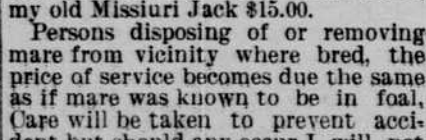
