Wattles of Omaha has decided not to be a candidate for the U. S. senate. Well, what was the use, anyway.

Some subscriber wrote the Times last week, nominating it's editor for the legislature. Ahem! Hon. E. A. Brown of Sherman.

It is asserted that the railway employees of Nebraska will organize to head off anti-railroad legislation. If that is done, the superior handwork of the railroad heads will be in evidence, in the minds of the people.

So far as we have been able to learn the united opposition to republicanism in Nebraska has been only able to muster a possible two candidates who express a long felt want for the nomination for gubernatorial honors.

Senator George Sheldon has announced he will be a candidate for governor, with anti-pass and railroad rate legislation, and an elective commission as his slogan. He thus throws down the gauntlet of fight to finish with the railroad forces.

The Sherman county republican central committee is called to meet at the office of Secretary Starr in this city on Saturday, June 2nd, at which meeting the time and place for holding the county convention will undoubtedly be given.

The state of Omaha cannot even think of letting the senatorship go away from it. The idea of it going anywhere outside has the same effect on its citizens that the sight of water has on a dog with the rabies. Even the pleasant aroma of Rose-water has no calming effect.

The supreme court on Monday reaffirmed the sentence in the lower court, and Senator Burton of Kansas must spend six months in jail and pay a fine of \$2,500, deprives him of a seat in the U. S. senate and debars him forever after from holding an office under this government.

George L. Rouse, speaker of the last house, is formally brought out by his (Hall) county for the governorship. However, the Independent of Grand Island (Rep.) can't see it that way, and is backing Rouse on account of his unsavory railroad record. "Nix come a Rouse." Not any of him for us, also.

Candidates for the various offices are being named rapidly these days. Among those spoken of late, we hear the name of A. P. Culley, as democratic candidate for the legislature. A. P. has some of the best symptoms of a good democrat, and the fact that he hails from Kentucky, should be the pass into the innermost councils.

As we intimated a couple of weeks since, the democrats of Sherman have no intention of allowing their populist friends to capture the political pot, but propose having a convention themselves and have a say of their own. Groups of democrats might have been seen on the street last Saturday discussing the situation and were informed by one of the leaders that they would undoubtedly hold a convention soon and place a complete ticket in the field.

In spite of the pessimistic belief of the knowing ones, the senate passed the Hepburn railroad rate bill last Saturday, and in the entire senate there were only three votes recorded against it—Foraker of Ohio, and Morgan and Pettus of Alabama. The measure had been under consideration for seventy days in that body and has caused more interest over the country than any other since the repeal of the purchasing clause of the Sherman bill in 1893. That it passed so nearly unanimous—71 to 3—will prove somewhat inconclusive to the reader of the proceedings and debates on the measure during its discussion.

## Articles of Incorporation, Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association

Know All Men By These Presents: That we, C. M. Snyder, Christ Zwick, W. H. Hughes, Rolla D. Hendrickson, J. B. Ford, James McBeth, A. W. Mason, John J. Zink, John N. Fisher, do associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the transaction of the business hereinafter described:

I. The name of the Corporation shall be the Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association.

II. The principal place of transacting its business shall be in the city of Loup City, county of Sherman, and state of Nebraska.

III. The nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be:

1. To buy, sell, exchange, store and ship all kinds of grain and farm products, and to carry on and maintain a general grain business.  
2. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in lumber, lime, hair, cement and all kinds of lumber and building material.  
3. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in coal and other fuel, and to carry on the wholesale and retail coal yards and to do a general coal business.  
4. To buy, sell, exchange and deal in animals and live stock of all kinds and to carry on and maintain stock yards and do a general stock shipping business.  
5. To buy, sell, lease, rent, exchange, own, hold and deal in real estate as far as may be necessary, incidental or advantageous in conducting the above described forms of business.  
6. Such business to be conducted at Loup City, Nebraska, and such other places in the United States as may be deemed expedient by the Board of Directors.

IV. The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000), in shares of ten dollars (\$10) each, to be paid on demand of the Board of Directors.

V. The existence of this Corporation shall commence on the 15th day of April, 1906, and continue during the period of twenty-five years unless sooner dissolved as provided by law.

VI. The business of said Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, not to exceed seven in number, to be elected by the stockholders, such elections to take place at such time and be conducted in such manner as shall be prescribed by the by-laws of said Corporation.

VII. The officers of said Corporation shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at the first regular meeting of the stockholders and shall hold their office for the period of one year, and until their successors shall be elected and qualified.

VIII. The highest amount of indebtedness to which said Corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than the paid up capital stock, and no one except a farmer actually engaged in tilling the soil shall be eligible to hold any office in this association.

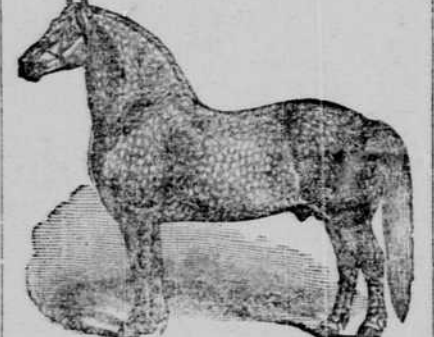
IX. The manner of holding the meetings of the stockholders for the election of officers and the methods of conducting the business of the corporation shall be provided for in the by-laws adopted by the Corporation.

X. The highest number of shares that any person shall be allowed to subscribe for or own shall be fifty (50), and he shall be allowed one vote only as though he owned but one share.

XI. No shareholder of this Corporation shall be individually liable for more than double his share of stock subscribed.

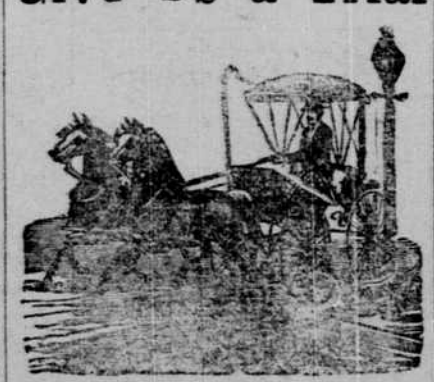
