Good Wife and Mother Gone.
As briefly mentioned last week, Mrs. Marie Lange, the beloved wife of Mr. Henry Lange, living near Ashton, died last week Wednesday morning at 5 o'clock of malignant cancer. The funeral was held Thursday afternoon following, Rev. L. C. McEwen conducting the services and Mrs. E. G. Taylor singing the beautiful song, "Saved by Grace," a large attendance of friends of the bereaved being present to pay their last sad respects. We are in receipt of but a short account of her life. Mrs. Marie Lange was born at Stolzenau, Hanover, Germany, Aug. 2nd, 1859. She came to America in 1881, was married to Henry Lange and settled in Sherman county, Nebraska, the same year, residing here ever since. She leaves a sorrowing husband and one daughter to mourn the loss of a kind, affectionate and indulgent wife and mother.

Articles of Incorporation, Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association

Know All Men By These Presents: That CHRIST ZWINK, W. H. Hughes, Bolla D. Hendrickson, J. B. Ford, James McBeth, A. W. Mason, John J. Zink, John N. Fisher, do associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the purpose of the business hereinafter described:

I. The name of the Corporation shall be the Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association.

The principal place of transacting its business shall be in the city of Loup City, county of Sherman, and state of Nebraska.

The nature of the business to be transacted by said Corporation shall be:

1. To buy, sell, exchange, store and ship all kinds of grain and farm products, and to carry on and maintain a general grain business.

2. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in lumber, lime, hair, cement and all kinds of lumber and building material.

3. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in coal and other fuel, and to carry on wholesale and retail coal yards and to do a general coal business.

4. To buy, sell, exchange and deal in animals and live stock of all kinds and to carry on and maintain stock yards and do a general stock shipping business.

5. To buy, sell, lease, rent, exchange, own, hold and deal in real estate as far as may be necessary, incidental or advantageous in conducting the above described forms of business.

6. Such business to be conducted at Loup City, Nebraska, and such other places in the United States as may be deemed expedient by the Board of Directors.

II. The authorized capital stock of said Corporation shall be one Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000), in shares of ten dollars (\$10) each, to be paid on demand of the Board of Directors.

III. The existence of this Corporation shall commence on the 15th day of April, 1906, and continue during the period of twenty-five years unless sooner dissolved as provided by law.

IV. The business of said Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, not to exceed seven in number, to be elected by the stockholders, such elections to take place at such time and be conducted in such manner as shall be prescribed by the by-laws of said Corporation.

V. The officers of said Corporation shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at the first regular meeting of the stockholders, and shall hold their office for the period of one year, and until their successors shall be elected and qualified.
