Omaha is being invaded by the big revivalist, Rev. Torrey, and that together with the trial of the big cattleman is making things lively in that burg.

Herman Kountze, the well known banker of Omaha is dead. He is said to have left his heirs some ten millions of dollars to keep the wolf from the door.

As usual, the newly elected state officers are being besieged by a hungry horde of seekers after place, each one in his own estimation having saved the day to republicanism.

The big cattlemen of west Nebraska are up for trial in the federal court at Omaha, and in spite of their efforts to stave off the case for the present are unable to do so and the big cases are on in full blast.

The horse doctor law passed by the last legislature will not hold water, as the decision of the courts in a test case that was made in this state recently, the law was found unconstitutional and now any one can doctor a horse or any other dumb brute without having to take out a license or having to undergo an examination.

The official vote of Nebraska has been presented to the people of Nebraska in tabulated form. By it we see that W. T. Thompson, for attorney-general, led in the race with a majority of 17,241, with Norris Brown next and State Superintendent McBrien third. Governor Sheldon was well down the list, but has 12,973 majority over Shallenberger.

Down at Dorchester, this state, the other day a liquor dealer was assessed a heavy fine under the anti-treating clause of the Nebraska liquor law, paid the fine and hastily decamped. This is something new in Nebraska, and if fines were attached to all such infractions of the law, it would cause the dry bones to rattle noticeably in about every town in Nebraska—except, of course, Loup City.

The expenses of the candidates for representative and for county attorney show that R. H. Mathew expended the sum of \$78.87 to land him in the county attorney's office, while E. A. Brown yielded up \$1 to forward his aspirations and entitle him to hold down a seat in the lower house of the Nebraska legislature. Carle McKinnie smote his exchequer to the tune of \$12.75 during the campaign, while R. P. Starr only reached in his trousers for \$7.35 to the aid. The Northwestern has not yet filed its expense account.

A letter from Bob Jenner, who is making his home for the winter on a wheat farm near Los Angeles, says the lawlessness at San Francisco is something fierce at present. He stopped over there a few days and avers that hold-ups and sand-bagging of victims occur daily, night and day, to the number of fifty or more, and on principal thoroughfares crowded with people these things occur daily and with the utmost daring, while the police seem powerless to prevent or stand in with the things. A nice condition of affairs, truly.

Don't scoff at the souvenir postal card craze. It has been given the endorsement and hearty approval of Postmaster General Cortelyou, and as a matter of fact it furnishes the government with a most profitable form of mail matter. In order to keep the profitable fad from dying out, the Postal Service has issued an order providing that all such cards may bear written messages on the front, the right half of the card being reserved for the address, and with sufficient postage they will be transmitted under the post card rates to foreign countries. The order goes into effect March 1, 1907, and the post cards will be treated alike in both the domestic and international mails.

The Aurora Sun man last week turned his caltrop batteries on the Northwestern because, forsooth we called "Judge" Edgar Howard of the Columbus Telegram a much over-rated man, in fact the most over-rated of the few democratic editors of Nebraska, so far as our knowledge went. Had we been acquainted with the Sun man, we might justly have said "the writer of the Aurora democratic paper excepted." The Aurora feeling evidently has that fellow feeling which makes one wondrous kind and proves he is the sort of a jackass on which Edgar has ridden into fame, if so it may be called. Now Edgar, the "Judge," should retaliate and help the Sun man to become known outside the confines of the little village in which he attempts to run a "news" paper.

The Omaha Bee's state capital correspondent says that it is now planned and it is said the plan has the sanction of Governor-elect Sheldon, to have introduced and passed by the legislature during the first fifteen days of the session all of the bills covering the points set out in the republican state platform—the anti-pass bill first, with the emergency clause attached; a bill to make the freight rates in effect January 1, the maximum charges to be made by the railroads; a separate bill giving the railway commission absolute power to reduce freight rates, with the emergency clause; for the taxation of railroad terminals for municipal purposes; the direct primary bill; and other planks of the platform. It is thought down here by those who want to carry out the platform that the bills will be prepared before the legislature meets and that they will be submitted to Mr. Sheldon.

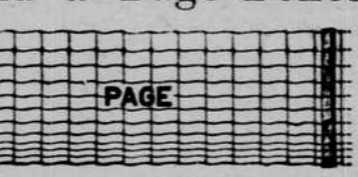
