Let us have a board of pardons by all means.

By a strict party vote, Norris Brown was on Tuesday elected United States senator from Nebraska, to succeed Millard. The vote stood 95 to 31.

Gov. Cummins in his message to the Iowa legislature recommended, among other measures, the passage of a two-cent per mile passenger rate.

A resolution in the senate provides docking of the pay of any employe any day he fails to be "johnny-on-the-spot." Now, if that august senator will make the same rule apply to himself and the other senators—but, naw! that's different!
