The question of seed corn is likely to prove a serious one to the farmers of Nebraska and the entire western states. From the best authorities we ascertain that last year's corn in most instances will not do for seed, the warm weather of the fall not allowing the cob to harden and dry properly, causing death of the germ in the seed. Yesterday we received a report from H. B. Musser giving four different tests as follows: One hundred kernels from 35 ears carefully cribbed and cared for showed a growth of 91 per cent; the same test from corn carefully cared for in two instances gave results of 47 and 30 per cent to the good, while another test of 200 kernels from corn that had been most carefully housed and dried only gave 95 per cent of life. It would be well for our farmers to test their seed corn most thoroughly before planting and be sure of good seed.

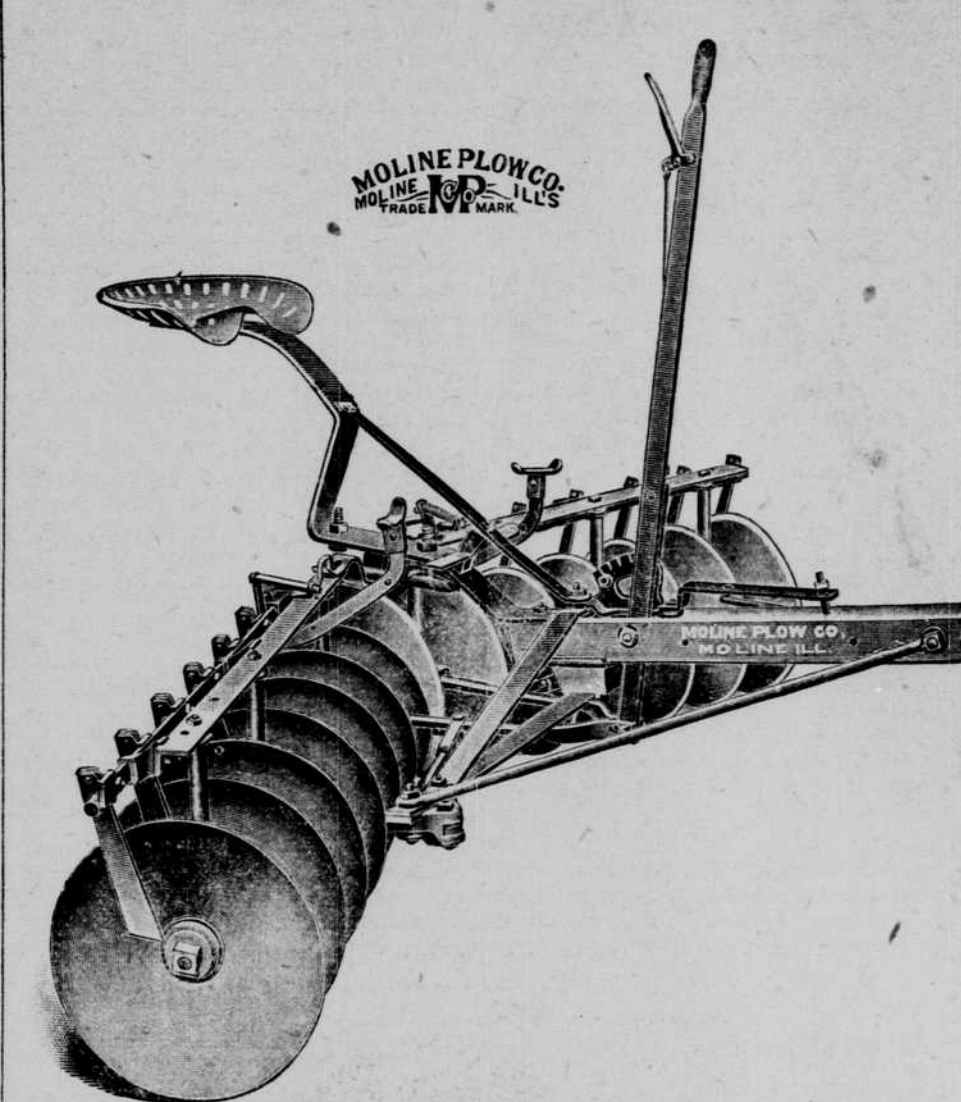
