Misses Florence Depew, Winnie Gasteyer and Alice Minshall visited Misses Brach's and Crew's rooms last Tuesday afternoon.

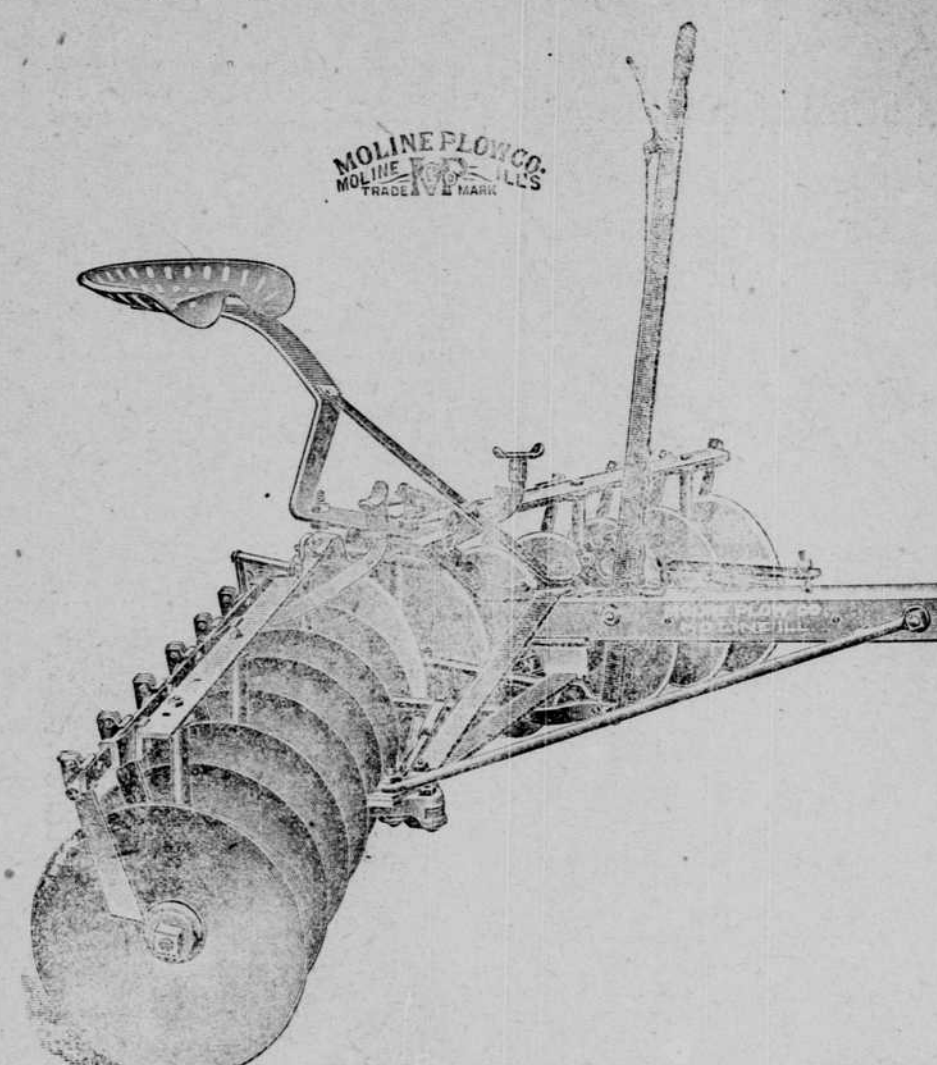
The first intermediate department has begun the new month with an enrollment of fifty pupils, Forrest Larsen having been added to the roll Monday morning.
