Propose to Vote Railroad Bonds.
BROKEN BOW, Neb., April 23.—The
railroad meeting called at Westerville
last Saturday for the purpose of en-
couraging the railroad movement
from Loup City to Broken Bow via
Westerville was largely attended. The
citizens of Westerville were very en-
thusiastic in their support of the
project, promising to vote precinct
bonds to the full extent of the law,
and also took largely of the capital
stock of the company. The sub-
scription books of the company were
left in charge of the committee ap-
pointed by the meeting, who were
given instructions to secure stock to
the amount of \$1 per acre for six
miles on each side of the line. The
company promoting the proposed line
is the Broken Bow & Western Rail-
road company. The officers of the
company were present and addressed
the meeting.

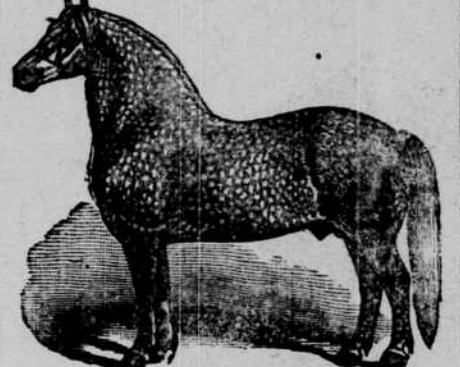

work as nice as any horse.

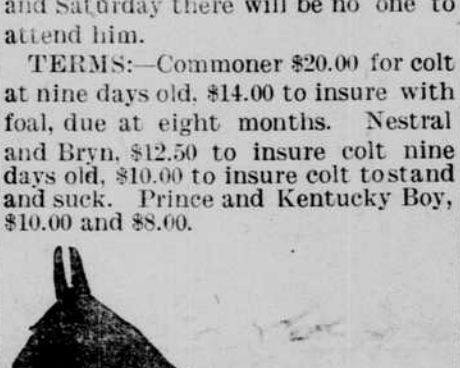
NESTRAL 46995, PRINCE 18271—
