The Republican County Central
Committee of Sherman county met in
the office of Judge Wall last Saturday
afternoon, pursuant to call. Judge
Aaron Wall was made the unanimous
choice for chairman of the central
committee, Henry Tangerman of
Rockville township for secretary and
Charles Snyder of Clay township for
treasurer. H. S. Conger was then by
unanimous consent elected delegate
to the state convention of delegates
at Lincoln, to formulate the party
platform and to reorganize the con-
vention of delegates under the new
primary law. On second thought,
Mr. Conger found it would be impos-
sible for him to accept, owing to the
dates of the coming carnival which
will be in full blast on the convention
date, he having made business ar-
rangements for the carnival dates. His
declining was accepted, and J. W.
Burleigh was chosen as delegate, but
the same reasons being being assigned
he was excused and the name of
R. P. Starr was presented as delegate.
Mr. Starr was about to decline, when
a reference to his business calendar
showed he had business in Lincoln
about the time of the convention
date, and accepted the unanimous
wish of the committee that he re-
present the party in said convention.
The work of organization was most
harmoniously performed and the best
of feeling manifest, and we may con-
fidently expect the bird of victory to
perch upon the Republican banner as
a result of this fall's elections.

Supervisors Proceedings.

Loup City, Neb., Sept. 10, 1907.
County Board of Supervisors met
this day in regular session, as per
adjournment of August 6, 1907. Pres-
ent D. C. Grow, chairman; A. Garstka,
H. Claussen, W. O. Brown, Chris Niel-
son, John Boecking and F. R. Wyman,
members, and C. F. Reushausen, clerk,
and the following business was trans-
acted.
The minutes of last meeting were
read and on motion were approved.
In the matter of the building of a
bridge on county line between Buffalo
and Sherman counties, about 1 mile
west of Sweetwater, the board accepted
the offer made by Buffalo county,
and agreed to pay one-half of said
bridge providing cost did not exceed
\$270.00.
The claim of the Spelts estate,
claiming a double tax, was laid over
to next meeting.
The board next opened bids on
file in the building cement walk on south
side of court yard, which was on
motion, awarded to Simpson & Bel-
man, they being the lowest bidders
therefor.
The Wolfstzewski road commencing
at southeast corner of Sec. 16-16-13
and extending thence south three miles
to southeast corner of Sec. 27-16-13,
was on motion ordered established pro-
viding Oak Creek township pays all
claims for damages.
The following official bonds were
approved by the board.
John A. Hand, road overseer, Dist.
No. 27.
Almor Fagan, road overseer, Dist.
No. 36.
F. D. Estabrook, road overseer, Dist.
No. 23.
The bridge petition of Joseph Se-
woksins et al, asking that the county
build a thirty-two foot bridge be-
tween sections seven and eight tp. 16,
r. 13, was granted by the board.
On motion board adjourned to Sept.
11, 1907. C. F. REUSHAUSEN,

Loup City, Neb., Sept. 11, 1907.
County Board of Supervisors met
this day as per adjournment of pre-
vious day; all present but John Boeck-
ing and F. R. Wyman who were sent
out the previous day to view roads.
The bids for hardware for bridge
purposes was awarded to Hayhurst-
Galloway Hardware Co.
The White road petition, commene-
ing at the southwest corner of Sec.
16-13, and running thence east one
mile and terminating at southeast
corner of Sec. 7, 16-13, was ordered
established, providing Oak Creek town-
ship pays all claims for damages.
The road petition signed by Wm.
Young and others, was brought up
for final order, and on motion said
road was established, providing Beck-

ville township pays all claims for dam-
ages, as follows: Commencing at
southeast corner of Sec. 24, 13-15, and
running thence west on section line
between sections 24 and 25, and termi-
nating at Union Pacific right-of-way.
An order was made that an addi-
tional out building be built on court
yard.
The consent petition of George
Woznick et al, asking that a road be
established, commencing at the south
corner stake of section corner between
sections three and four, 16-15, and
running thence north one quarter
of mile, thence west one mile to road No.
318, was on motion ordered establish-
ed.
The Wyman consent road
was ordered established, commencing
at quarter stake of Set. 28 and 33, and
running thence west on section line
two and one-half miles till it reaches
the Custer county line.
The board passed a resolution de-
claring the following described pro-
posed road a public necessity, com-
mencing at a point on section line
between sections 11 and 14, 14-15,
where road no. 32 now ends, and run-
ning thence west to the southwest
corner of said section 11, running
thence north on section line one mile
thence east two miles and termi-
nating at northeast corner of section 12,
14-15, and set the day of filing claims
for damages on or before noon of the
12th day of November, 1907.


