The time will come yet when the sons of the men now settling in the west will go back east to redeem the worm out eastern farms."

Testing Seed Corn.

It is probable that few campaigns of any character have been conducted more thoroughly than has the recent campaign to get farmers to test their seed corn. The Commercial clubs of both Omaha and Lincoln attempted to impress the importance of this work on the farmers, the universities lentw a helping hand and the most recent bulletin is that of State Superintendent Bishop in which he attempted to interest county superintendents and school teachers in the work.
