King Edward VII. of Great Britain died last Friday night near midnight of bronchitis and pneumonia, after a reign of only about ten years.

North Loup reports a number of cases of scarlet fever, though none of the patients seem to be in any way distressed and the disease is very light, if scarlet fever it be.

An earthquake at San Jose, Costa Rica, last week Wednesday night caused the death of over 1,500 persons, injured many thousands and over 7,000 were rendered homeless.

Under the laws of California the governor claims he has no power to stop the Jeffries-Johnson prize fight, scheduled for July 4th, and against which all the forces for morality and decency are protesting.

Prof. J. W. Seanson, formerly of the Peru normal, and who is so well and favorably known by the teachers of Sherman county, having taught here in the county normals some three different years, has been elected president of the Manhattan (Kansas) State Agricultural school.

Grant G. Martin of Fremont, who is at present deputy under Attorney General Thompson, has filed for attorney general to succeed his chief, who steps down at the close of his second term with highest honors. The republicans of the state will undoubtedly report favorably at the primaries for Mr. Martin.

The Ravenna News came out last week with a big scare head over the fire at Rockville, emblazoning the idea that the fire was caused by burglars and that the bank safe showed an attempt had been made on it by some of that gentry. From what we have learned in regard to the fire, our News brother or his informant must be of a very imaginative turn of mind.

The Cattle exhibit at the State Fair, Sept. 5th to 9th, will be a "hummer." O. E. Mickey of Osceola is again the superintendent of this part of the great show. Those who are acquainted with "Ed" know that his chief aim in life is to make each succeeding show the "record" and that is what the 1910 exhibit will be. Already steps are being taken to arrange for additional accommodations which will be necessary to properly house this department, as many Nebraska breeders in future years will desire to see, "I made a cattle show at the Nebraska State Fair the year the Coliseum was built."

A minister a few days since, evidently seeking notoriety, insisted in his pulpit that Halley's comet was really the Star of Bethlehem. But later, Prof. Rigge, the Omaha astronomical seer, explodes the young boomer, by claiming that Halley's comet, if it appeared at that time on its scheduled 75-year run, according to the record of Chinese astrologers, must have preceded the birth of Christ by from seven to eleven years, and it was ridiculous to think that the wise men must have set out from the east so many years before the anticipated birth of Christ.

It is rumored that ex-Gov. Sheldon will again be a candidate for governor this fall. This is said to be vouched for by his former secretary. Another report has it that Sheldon would prefer running for U. S. senator. In fact, Sheldon's self-esteem is sufficient to give him a pipe dream to the effect that he would make a very acceptable president, if the people could be persuaded to see it that way. However, there are a great many of us who are not enthusiastic believers in the former governor being half the wonderful man he thinks he is, and would be in favor of his going way back and sitting down with the mass of private citizens.

The Mellors on Shipboard

We are privileged to print a letter from W. R. Mellor written on board the Empress Ireland April 28th, and received by his brother, Chas. E. Mellor, of this city:

"Dear Charley and All: As we are on the briny deep, it is fitting that we should write a letter. We came from St. Johns, leaving at 10 p. m. Friday night, and ran through a dense fog until landing at Halifax Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock, when we took on mail and left at 7. I was seasick about half an hour Saturday morning. I was writing a letter, when I began feeling funny and repairing to the toilet room, stuck one finger down my throat and found relief. Mrs. Mellor has been sick all the way and was not out of bed all day yesterday. She is getting awfully thin from the fact that she cannot retain any nourishment, but we expect to land at Liverpool tomorrow night, when this letter will be mailed, and then we hope she will recuperate rapidly. The immense power exhibited by this boat is marvelous to me, as no matter from which way the wind blows, nor from what quarter, whether the sea be rough, choppy or calm, the great engines keep up their ceaseless grind, and the speed is apparently the same under all conditions. We are averaging about 424 miles each day. There is a Marconi wireless telegraph station on board and every morning is placed at our breakfast table a copy of a little paper printed on board, in which we have all the important news items of the world which happened the day before, a marvel which reminds one that the miracles of the old days were no more wonderful. Every day passes about the same. After breakfast, we take a morning walk on the deck (our boat being 355 feet long) until we are tired, then we play deck quills, billiards or sand bag, children's morning games, or go to the cabin, where reading, card games or concerts are always in order. The sailors gave us a fine concert night before last. They have a fine pianist, a most excellent violinist and several soloists and a reader. They invited a couple of ladies and myself to participate, and I rendered "Good Bye, Little Girl" for them. We had an audience of about 250 from the first and second cabins and the collection taken for the Liverpool Sailors' Home amounted to even ten guineas (about \$40.50). Our permanent address is care of the American Express Co., 5 and 6 Haymarket Square, London, England, from which address mail will be forwarded to us wherever we may be. With best regards to all relatives and friends."
