County Primary Election

The following candidates won out in the Sherman county primary election last Tuesday: For U. S. Senator - Burkett, rep. and Whitner, demo. For Governor - Cady, rep., Dahlman, dem. and Shallenberger, pop. For Lieut. Gov. - Hopewell, rep. and Green, dem. For Sec. of State - Wait, rep. and Gatewood, dem. For Auditor - Barton, rep. and Bernecker, dem. For Treasurer - George, rep. and Metimley, dem. For Supt. - Crabtree, rep. and Arnot, dem. For Attorney General - Martin, rep. and Whitner, demo. For Land Commissioner - Lyon, rep. and Beushausen, dem. For Congressman - Kinkaid, rep. and Taylor, dem. For State Senator - Culley, rep. and Bodinson, dem. For Representative - Waite, rep. and Rein, dem. For County Attorney - Starr, rep. and Mathew, dem.

Dahlman carried Sherman county by 25. Oh, we're not proud up here. Bryan has stamped his official seal on Hitchcock and sends word he will support him for renator. Of course, party first with Mr. Bryan; temperance not a paramount issue. See?

Burkett's majority over Whedon in Sherman county was 24, and in the state was over four to one; in fact Whedon carried but one or two counties out of the ninety in the state.

Latest reports from the seat of war are to the effect that Shallenberger has asked for a recount of votes in a number of counties. The Bee gives Dahlman 200 majority, and the vote practically all in.

In his speech at St. Paul just before the primaries, Dahlman said: "I have a wife and two daughters who belong to the church and pray for me every day. I can't be such a very bad man, can I?" The crowd appreciated his pungent paraphrase.

The official primary ballot in Hamilton county contained no blank lines and sentiment is divided as to whether there would have been. Either the Hamilton county ballot was illegal or ballots in counties containing said blanks are illegal. Which?

We haven't the time nor the inclination" nor the space to publish a tabulated statement of the official primary vote of Sherman county. However, we have the official vote on hand and any one is privileged to copy the same, if interested enough, or we will give figures in total on any office by request, over phone or otherwise.

It is confidently asserted that as both nominees for state senator in this 10th district are "dry" men, the "wets" will put up a "moist" candidate by petition. In this case, it will be necessary for either Clark or Bodinson to withdraw, or the division of the "dry" vote will result in the election of the whisky candidate. Now mark that prediction.

Here's a few queries: With Aldrich republican, and Dahlman, democratic, candidates for governor, what will be the result if Shallenberger accepts the pop nomination given him? Will not the three-cornered fight elect Dahlman? If such would be the probable outcome, as is generally conceded, will Shallenberger stay in? If he did, would he not suborn principle to party?

The nominations of Waite and Rein for representative in this county, will make a clean-cut county option fight in Sherman this fall, unless some blunder-heads put up a petition candidate, which it is hoped will not be done. Messrs. Waite and Rein are good representatives of either side of county option and we believe our people favor a straight-out fight on this all-absorbing question.

The Aurora Sun, edited by a minister of the gospel, announced last week if Dahlman was nominated that paper would support him. The Sun has argued prior to the primary that Dahlman was a gambler, a boozier, an upholder of the wide-open open saloon, against the eight-hour law, and not fit for governor, and now crawls. Wonder if the Sun is a fair specimen of the other democratic papers of the state that have been bitterly opposing the nomination of Halless Jim?

The result of the primary election, so far as the heads of the ticks were known was made definitely certain by last Friday night, when Shallenberger conceded his defeat at the hands of Dahlman for the democratic nomination for governor, reserving for himself the measly comfort of securing the populist plum for the same office.

On the republican side, Cady acknowledged a day earlier his defeat by Aldrich for the same office.

For U. S. senator, Burkett and Hitchcock had walkaways for the nomination from their respective parties.

For the other state offices, the result is not yet known, all election returns being confined to the heads of the tickets.

For congress in the Big Sixth, Kinkaid won by two or three to one, really no contest worth mentioning. On the democratic side, Dean had a close fight with Taylor, winning in a neck-and-neck race.

For state senator, Clark and Bodinson got there easily, the latter having no opposition.

The west river bridge being reported in bad shape and in need of repair it was on motion ordered that the bridge committee inspect said bridge and see what necessary repairs ought to be made and also to proceed to Rockville and see what can be done with the river bridge at that place to make it passable and safe, and report at next meeting of board.

On motion the clerk was ordered to advertise for sealed bids for a cement walk on the west side of public square in Loup City. On motion the petition for vacation of streets and alleys in Hazard village was on motion allowed.

The Brundige consent road petition asking for road in Harrison township was on motion allowed. On motion the board ordered the clerk to have printed on the November election ballots the following, to-wit:

The proceeds of said sale to be used in paying part of county's indebtedness which falls due in Nov. 1910. Henry Beck was authorized to collect the rent from Will Spencer for the use of Sherman county's 40 acres in Elm township and report at next meeting.

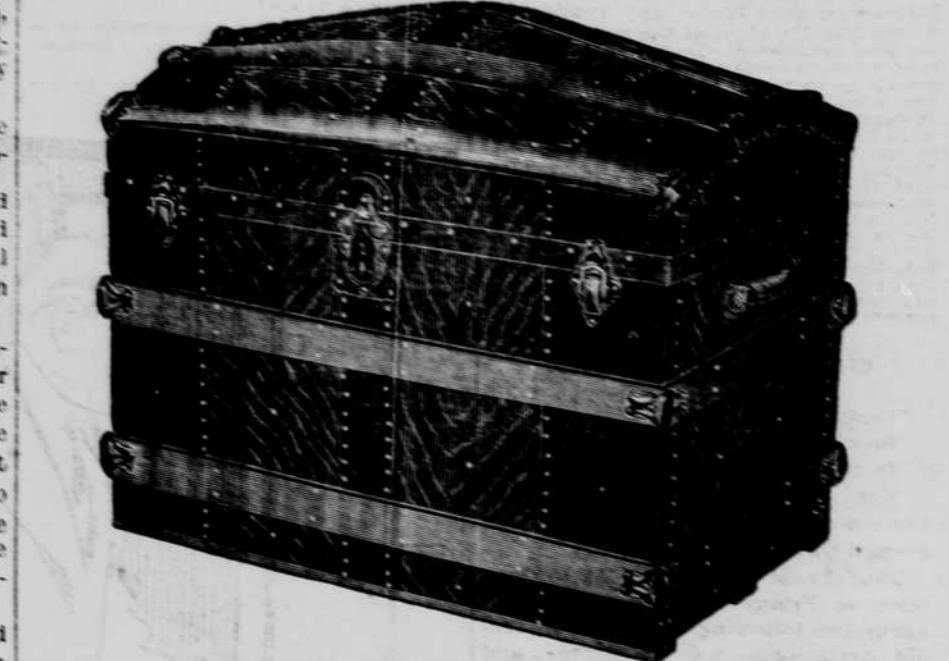
