The brewers and distillers of Ne-  
braska will find this fall, when the  
returns come in that their power in  
the state has gone glimmering.

R. L. Metcalfe, assistant editor of  
Bryan's Commoner, and late demo-  
cratic candidate for senatorial nomi-  
nation, has come out squarely for  
Aldrich, republican for governor and  
as strongly against Dahlen, the  
boose candidate of the brewers and  
distillers for the same office.

Wednesday's dailies contain a re-  
pudiation of Dahlen's candidacy by  
Bryan. It was a little tardy, but  
was the only correct thing the Peer-  
less could do in honor to himself.  
With two such men as Bryan and  
Metcalfe coming out against the  
boose candidate, Dahlen is swiftly  
being lowered into the pit of defeat.

The populist state committee in  
session at Lincoln Tuesday could not  
agree on endorsing the republican  
candidate for governor, leaving the  
head of the ticket blank, but equally  
as forcible is their denunciation of  
Dahliman, and he can get little,  
if any, support from populism over  
the state. Dahlen is going down  
the toboggan slide in good shape.

The Holbrook Observer, a demo-  
cratic paper and opposed to county  
option, comes out against Dahlen.  
It says while against county option,  
it favors the will of the people and if  
a county option law carries is in  
favor of a governor who will uphold  
the will of the majority, which  
Dahlen says he will not do, hence  
the Observer will not support the  
hairless montrosity.

Arthur Hoxey, the aeroplane man  
who met with the accident at the  
State Fair, met with a much worse  
disaster at Milwaukee last Friday,  
when a Wright aeroplane which he  
was driving swerved sideways from  
its course and plunged into a crowd  
before the grandstand at the state  
fair, seriously injuring five women  
and three men, all of whom will re-  
cover. Hoxey was uninjured.

In the democratic contest between  
Dean and Taylor for the congression-  
al nomination, the committees have  
decided in favor of Taylor. He is  
not nearly as strong a man as Dean,  
who would have received a very sub-  
stantial republican vote, in this  
county, at least, which Taylor can't  
touch. Congressman Kinkaid will  
not have to run to be elected; he  
need only sit peacefully down and  
voters will hand him the election  
without any exertion on his part.

Shallenberger has given up as  
beaten in his contest for the nomi-  
nation, and comes out in a letter  
saying he yields to Dahlen and  
promises to support the brewer can-  
didate. Thus the temperance demo-  
crats and populists can see how much  
of principle is in the make-up of the  
present governor. His seems to be  
the case of anything for office or  
political elevation. Shallenberger  
already has dreams of being U. S.  
senator in the future. Thus the  
whyness.

When the Upper Iowa conference  
met at Charles City last week, one  
of the most difficult problems was  
supplying the vacancies caused by  
the retirement of active pastors, who  
in the main are leaving the ministry  
for secular work. It is said that the  
number who left the ministry this  
year is between thirty and forty,  
most of them young and able men,  
but who claim that the salary they  
receive will not support and educate  
their families. In the Northwestern  
Iowa conference, thirty-seven min-  
isters have retired from the ministry  
for the same reason.

**What is County Option?**

Our friends, the Dahlenites, are  
continuing trying to befog the minds  
of the voters in regard to the main  
issue in the pending political cam-

no license. While the fact is that  
county option means simply and only

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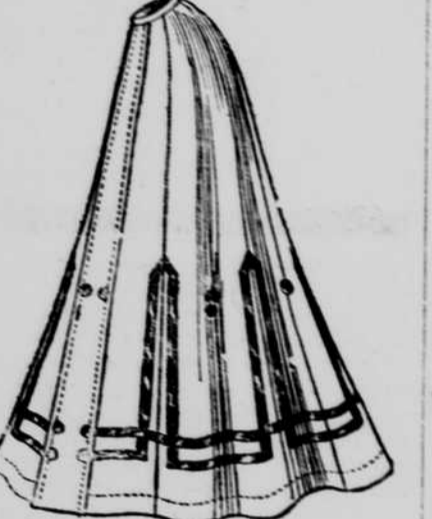

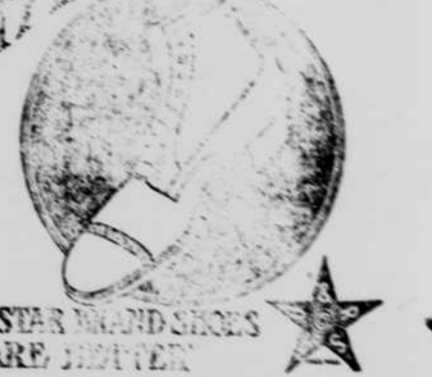

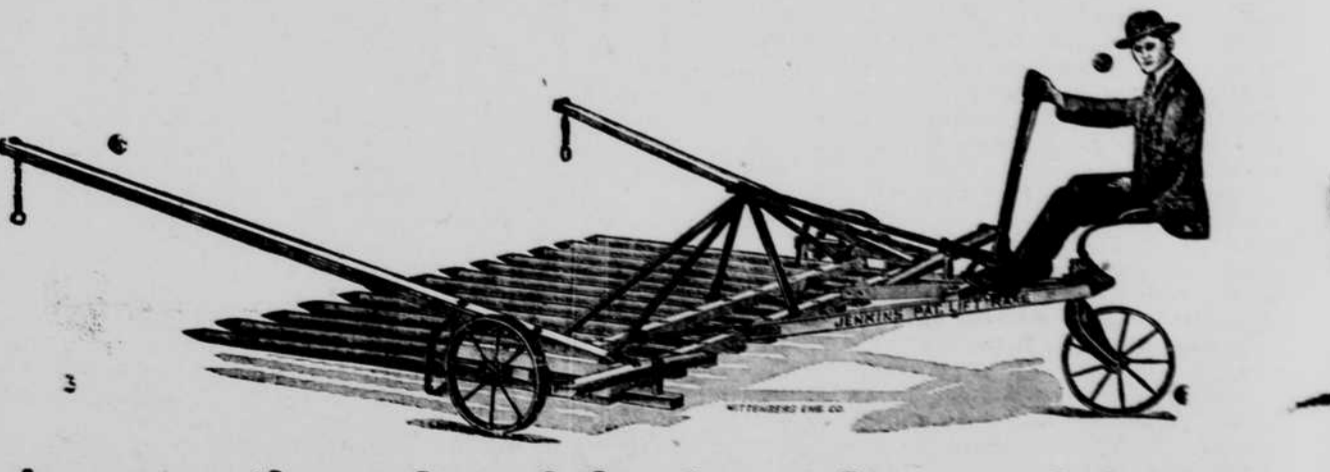
