The papers of Dahlihan persuasion have been publishing a bit of scandal in the past few days mixing C. H. Aldrich up as an attorney in another divorce case of some nine years ago. Mr. Aldrich denies any truth in the sensational story. The story is about on a par with the other stuff being retailed and wholesaled against the republican candidate for governor.

To those who have been commenting on the attitude of the Omaha Bee regarding its stand in the present campaign, Victor Rosewater a few days since, in a signed letter on the editorial page gave it out in no uncertain tones that he was supporting the candidacy of Chester H. Aldrich and the entire republican ticket.

The attempted flight in an airship by Walter Wellman from New York across the Atlantic is one of the greatest aeronautic feats ever attempted. That he failed was expected, and the rescue of himself and his men by aid of wireless some three hundred miles off the coast of North Carolina, gives one of the most thrilling narratives of the age. It was one of the most foolhardy things ever attempted. Wellman and five assistants left New York City in the balloon America Sunday morning last, on Tuesday morning about daylight, after a most thrilling experience managed to extricate themselves in their boat attached to the balloon and were picked up by the steamship Trent, after the wireless between the Trent and the balloon had brought them within range of each other.

The sudden death last Saturday evening of Senator Jonathan P. Dolliver at his home in Fort Dodge, Iowa, came as an utter surprise to the entire world, even his own family and his attending physicians not realizing the serious nature of his illness till the moment of his passing away. He had suffered with heart trouble, but was up and around the house at the time. His physician had called to examine the action of his heart and at the time of his death was using the stethoscope counting the heart beats as the senator lay easily in a chair, when suddenly the instrument failed to record any heart action and upon looking in the face of Mr. Dolliver found he was dead. His funeral occurs this afternoon and will be attended by prominent men from over the country. He was one of the greatest orators and most widely known men of the country.

The liquor business is conducting a losing fight. So Bonfort's Wine and Spirit Circular intimates in a recent editorial. Noting the number of states where the trade is in a desperate battle for its life, it says: "The situation is a grave one, and it demands the attention of the men who have hundreds of millions invested in breweries, distilleries, wineries, and in stocks of liquors. It is a situation that demands the highest statesmanship and generosity. It raises the question as to why we have lost so many states and why we have so many fierce contests in other states. It raises the question as to whether our cause as a trade is in competent or in incompetent hands, or whether it can be possible that the liquor trade is so disreputable that it can not be successfully defended before the bar of public sentiment. This is the business that is making an unflinching effort to put an open advocate in the office of governor of Nebraska. It is unthinkable that such a man or such a cause can succeed after a fair campaign in this state.

The political history of Nebraska this fall is full of interest, more so than for many years in the past. The digging up of the ghost of State Treasurer Bartley's defalcation, the mysteries of which it seemed never were to be unravelled, is now tearing up the turf in the democratic party. Howard claims U. S. candidate Hitchcock was a beneficiary of Bartley's defalcation and has demanded the resignation of the latter, who denies receiving any such benefits, and the controversy brings brings Defaulter Bartley into the war and it looks very much as if Howard was there with the goods; that Hitchcock really did get some of the state's money for which Bartley served time in the pen, and at least the people will get a little further glimpse into the inside history of the great scandal. That Bartley was but the scapegoat of high-up thieves to whom he gave the state's money and was made to wear stripes for other's wrongs, is becoming more and more the belief of the people. That Hitchcock got more or less of the state's money through Bartley is Howard's contention, and it looks very much like Hitchcock is guilty and would better have taken the no very gentle hint, and pulled out of the race. Here is a query: Suppose it is at least morally proved that Hitchcock did really get some of the state's money through Bartley and that he was found worthy of wearing stripes, and should this fall receive the most votes at the election for U. S. senator, won't it place members of the legislature who signed statement No. 1 in a pretty pickle, especially republican members?
