GOT OFF EASY

Roebbeck, Paid All Costs and Free-Returns Here and Hies Away Again

Last week the Northwestern had an article on a young fellow who was arrested by Sheriff Williams on complaint of forgery from Grand Island officers and who was later taken to that city to answer the charge. The Independent of Monday contained the following climax:

Frank L. Roebbeck, the man who was charged with forging the check at Hexter's store for \$25.50 was released, after paying all costs in the case. Roebbeck, it is reported, is not exactly right at all times and it is claimed that it was a question with the attorneys in the case whether he could be prosecuted, even if the evidence given in court showed him to be guilty.

Monday evening Roebbeck came up from Grand Island, got his trunks, three of them, from the U. P. depot, together with a couple of suit cases and two hat boxes, had them transferred to the B. & M., and left Tuesday morning over that road, purchasing a ticket for Kansas City, although he told parties here he was going to Aurora, where he had a brother. He was very uncommunicative while here, merely saying it was all a mistake, and that he was not the man wanted, which seems not to have been the case, as noted by the item copied above. Word received here from Grand Island officers was to the effect that the young man had been in an asylum two or three times, and as it was a question whether or not they could make a case against him, they allowed him to make good the check he had cashed pay the costs in the case and go free. He claimed coming back here to work for the Times, but after taking a look at Boushousen, it is supposed he changed his mind, as he remarked he guessed he did not care whether he stayed or not, and the further fact that that office had another man in view, Roebbeck left as above stated.

Unkind critics, in commenting here on the release of Roebbeck from the clutches of the law, and probably having in view the unpleasant history of Loup City editors in the present and past, suggested that probably when Roebbeck gave it out he belonged to that class, officers concluded he was not accountable and released him.
