By the Wednesday morning dailies  
we see that Bellevue College and  
Omaha University are to be con-  
solidated. Committees from both  
colleges were enthusiastically in favor  
of the merger and it will undoubtedly  
result in the consolidation of the two.

A county option bill has been  
framed by the legislature, in which  
Poulson, the head of the Anti-Saloon  
League, seems to have no part nor  
parcel. The lawmaking boys do not  
seem to have the proper appreciation  
of the great head of the anti-saloon  
business.

Occasionally you hear some super-  
intellectual son-of-a-gas-meser say,  
"Oh, yes, there are newspapers in  
this town, but they don't amount to  
much—nobody reads them." But let  
that individual or some member of  
his family go wrong and watch him  
hotfoot it to the newspaper offices  
and humbly request the editors to  
suppress the facts.—Aurora Republic.

A bill has been introduced in the  
legislature to increase the per diem  
of county commissioners from \$3 to  
\$4 per day. Not a bad move, when  
one takes into consideration that  
commissioners are generally men of  
interests to whom the time taken  
from their own interests and placed  
at the disposal of the commonwealth  
means a substantial loss to them-  
selves.

Appropos of the establishment of a  
state dipso law, a certain editor's  
wife, and this is not to be considered  
a personal allusion, thinks it might  
not be an unwise plan for the state  
to provide a "smoko law" as well,  
where husbands who are "smoko"  
fends might be committed, or scared  
into personal care. Respectfully sub-

Senator Hoagland of Lincoln county  
has prepared a new legislative  
apportionment bill which places  
Sherman, Valley, Greeley and How-  
ard counties in one senatorial dis-  
trict called District No. 21. At  
present Sherman with Buffalo com-  
prises District 16. According to the  
proposed new apportionment, there  
is to be no change in the matter of  
representative, Sherman still to have  
its one. How do you like the pro-  
posed change?

Representatives in the legislature  
from Buffalo and Hall counties, of  
which Kearney and Grand Island are  
the hubs, eagerly sought last week  
to prevent an appropriation by the  
legislature to fix up a room in the  
basement of the capitol for the use  
of the State Normal Board, under  
the plea that the agitation for capitol  
removal might win and in that event  
further expense on the present build-  
ing should not be made. We hardly  
believe, outside of these two estima-  
ble capitals of the counties named,  
there is any perceptible demand for a  
change from Lincoln.

The derermination of Gov. Aldrich  
to consider only those applications  
for executive clemency which are  
made upon the grounds of some  
newly discovered testimony that  
might have modified the verdict had  
it been introduced in the trial court,  
will meet with the approval of all  
who believe in the impartial adminis-  
tration of justice. When the framers  
of the constitution placed the pard-  
oning power in the hands of the  
governor, they did not contemplate  
that the power should be used so  
indiscriminately as it has been used  
by former executives. It is high  
time that this method of cheating  
justice should be discontinued. It  
is a menace to society and a breeder  
of crime.—Aurora Republican.

**Smallpox Scare**

Tuesday morning of this week, the  
residence of Chas. Sickels was quar-  
antined for smallpox, Mr. Sickels  
being a victim, according to the  
officials. At noon that day the pub-  
lic schools were closed by order of  
the board until further orders. The  
alleged disease was claimed to have  
been brought here some two weeks  
ago by a brother of Mr. Sickels from  
Iowa, and in the meantime it has  
spread through several families of  
relatives west of town, the alleged  
victims being covered with a rash  
over the face and body, accompanied  
with slight fever and headache, but  
not serious enough to confine any-  
body to their home and bed, nor  
cause any serious sickness. Several  
families in the city have passed thro'  
a siege of the pimply eruptions, with-  
out any thought of it being of a  
serious nature. A wire was Tuesday  
sent to and received from a leading  
physician in the Iowa town whence  
the brother of Mr. Sickels came, and  
he declares there is not, nor has there  
been a case of smallpox there for the  
past few years. That the disease is  
some kind of a rash, or chicken-pox, is  
not in doubt, but that the disease is  
genuine smallpox we may be pardoned  
for doubting, and that doubt is  
shared by a leading physician, who  
has pronounced it nothing of the  
kind, and by a goodly number of our  
citizens. It is thought the schools  
will open again this coming Monday.

The democrats finally got together  
on the organization of the two  
branches of the legislature, including  
the committees, and now they are in  
fine shape to spend a lot of public  
money and do nothing for the public  
good.—Ord Quiz.

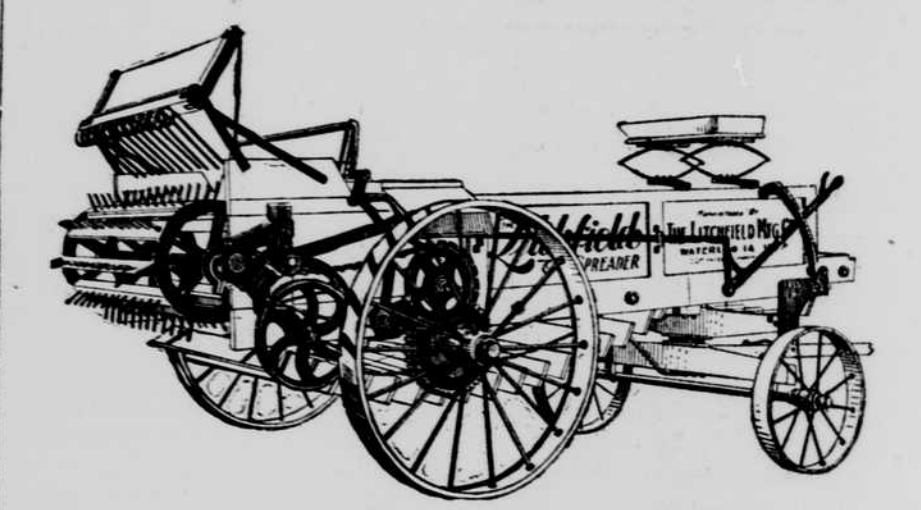
