I find that it will be impossible for me to visit all or even one half of the voters in Sherman county by driving, therefore I take this last chance before the primary election of August 15th, 1911, to reach you through the columns of this paper.

I have served as teacher sixteen years. I taught as principal of the Litchfield schools one year, as principal at Ashton two years, and as principal of Rockville Schools for the past three years, and have been elected to that position for the coming year. I taught as principal of schools in Iowa and South Dakota before coming to Nebraska.

I am a graduate of the Nebraska State Normal school at Wayne and have done two years University work. Having taught in both country and graded schools, I am in a position to judge of and also to be in sympathy with both graded and rural teachers.

I was a candidate for County Superintendent of Sherman county four years ago and lost, by eight votes. I am married and have four children, and am better enabled to study childhood and to work for its development into useful citizenship. It also enables me to see the situation from a parent's standpoint.

I am not the candidate of any particular man. I have never asked for the support of any paper in the county. I believe in absolute cleanliness and honesty in political as well as social and private life; further, I believe that a county officer does not and should not pose as representing any particular section or faction of the county, because he should and must treat all parts of the county alike, and without partiality in his official capacity, or he is not a good, true officer.
