### **Crop Statistics**

Despite an unfavorable crop season n some portions of the state. Nebraska shows up a good average value of cereal staples of this year. State Labor Commissioner Louis V. Guye has prepared a tabulations of the agri-cultural data gathered by his office and finds that where there has been a loss of crop value in one section or on one kind of grain it is made up by gains on other products or in more favored districts.

Ge After Train Crew at Hazard With Knives and Guns.

One of the Italians made a vicious jab at Brakeman Hutchison with a knife, catching him in the sleeve of the coat, but inflicting no wound. Have you read the Tramp Law? Talk about class legislation, discrimination, etc., have you ever read the state law relating to tramps? If a tramp refuses to do some work for you after he has asked you for food clothing or lodging, and you have asked him to do the work, he can be fined or imprisioned for failure to perform his part of the contract. If tramp—and this applies only to roving vagabonds-grows angered over a refusad to give him a handout and assaults you or your property, or by threats or force secures food or clothing, he is guilty of a penitentiary offense. And no officer need have a warrant to arrest a tramp for any offense. Furthermore, this law does not apply to women, to blind persons or boys undersixteen. Don't beleive it? Well, here's the law:

"Any person going about from place to place and asking or subsisting upon charity shall be taken and

leemed to be a tramp. "Any tramp who shall ask and receive from any person of any precinct town or village or city within this state any food, clothing or lodging or other assistance, may be requested by to form a reasonable amount of labor therefore and any such tramp who when so requested shall be demed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than three dollars or more than twenty dollars and cost of prosecution day for each dollar of fine; or may be shall be required to perform any such labor before six o'clock in the morning nor after six o'clock in the even-

"Any tramp who shall wilfully and maliciously do any injury to any person, or to the property real or personal of any person of any person, or who shall procure food, clothing or other property from any person by threats ed to some other state to seek a home or by force shall be deemed guilty of do you know that the average corn shall be punished by confinement at hard labor, in the state prison for a term not exceeding three years and not less than one year.

"This act shall not apply to any minor under the age of sixteen years nor to any femal or blind person.

"Whenever any tramp in this state shall have committed any offense de-scribed in this act, any sheriff, debuty sheriff, constable, city marshall, or policeman of the county, precinct, town or city in which such offense is mitted may without warrant, and it is hereby made their duty to apand finds that where there has been a loss of crop value in one section or on one kind of grain it is made up by gains on other products or in more avored districts.

The amount of cash for all the people of the United capita while that in Nebraska is \$166. In the face of these conditions actualy existing, why should our citizens search elsewhere for a home of investment?"
