Billy Sunday, the noted evangelist, is turning Wichita, Kansas, inside out from a religious standpoint, and his epigrams, as usual, are somewhat startling, unconventional, and by the way very wholesome from a truth, ful standpoint. Here is one: "Lots of people are put in as officials of churches because they have several suits of clothes and a fat bank account, when they would look better in penitentiary suits."

Democrats are getting into the game early. Last week, both John H. Moore head of Falls City and R. L. Metcalfe, editor of Bryan's Commonwealth, announced their intention of becoming candidates for the democratic nomination for governor. Besides these, Charley Pool of Tecumseh, Senator Ollis of Ord and Senator Velp of Scribner are getting their running shoes on in the mad race for a nomination, to see which one will have the honor of being defeated by Gov. Aldrich.

Teddy Roosevelt might as well surrender. There seems to be a determined effort to make him take his medicine in the shape of another term as president of Uncle Sam's domain. So he said when he was made to swallow the vice presidential nomination a few years ago. But he surrendered then, and there is a possibility that overwhelming public sentiment may cause his surrender this time. He was never known to surrender to a foe, but was made to yield to friends then and may have to do so again. This is neither "standpat" nor so-called "progressive" talk.

The postoffice authorities at Washington request, for the benefit of the public that special attention be called to the foreign letters rates many foreign letters being posted with only two cents in stamps attached. The only foreign countries to which the two cent letter rate applies are Canada, Cuba, Mexico, New Foundland, the Canal Zone, Panama, Germany (by direct steamers only) England, Scotland, Wales, and Ireland and the city of Shanghai, China. To all other countries including all other places than Shanghai in China, the rate is five cents for the first ounce or fraction thereof and three cents for each additional ounce or fraction which must be fully prepaid or the letters become liable on delivery to a charge equal to double the amount of the deficient postage. For instance a single rate letter prepaid only two cents, being short-paid three cents, is subject to an additional charge of six cents.

## Mrs. Elizabeth Perkins

Elizabeth Shepherd was born in Jansville, Wyoming Co., N. Y., May 15, 1848, on December 31, 1863, she was married to Lewis Wilson Perkins at Warsaw, N. Y. To this union eight children, five boys and three girls were born. Two little boys died in infancy.

In April 1878 the family moved to Midland, Mich., where they lived until the fall of 1880 when they came to Kendall County.

Her husband died Nov. 4, 1897. The next spring Mrs. Perkins bought a home in Plano. She lived here until 1903 when she went to Loup City, Nebraska to make her home with her oldest son. She has been a welcome visitor in Plano several times since.

The last time she was here was the summer of 1908 at which time she went to Cortez, Colo., where her son had moved the previous spring.

Last May she was taken sick with pleural pneumonia. Everything possible was done for her comfort and for her comfort and for a time she recovered and was up about the house. A few weeks ago she began to fail and on Tuesday Nov. 21, she joined her husband. She joined the M. E. church in her early girlhood and has always been a faithful worker for the cause she loved.

She leaves six children, Mrs. R. D. Cody, of Detroit, Mich.; E. W. Perkins of Cortez, Col.; Mrs. Geo Gray of Midland Mich.; R. L. Perkins and Mrs. Will DeGoff of this city and Louis E. Perkins also of Cortez. There are also twenty-one grand children and one great grand child, and one sister, Mrs. M. S. Allen of Warsaw, N. Y. The funeral services were held on Nov. 27 from the M. E. church. Rev. Mr. Meserve officiating who preached a most comforting sermon from the "Precious in the sight of the Lord are the death of his saints." She was laid to rest in the Ausable cemetery beside her husband.—The Kendall County (Ill.) News.

## Ordinance No. 89

An ordinance providing for the issuance of builder's permits for the erection and construction of buildings within the City of Loup City, Nebraska, and providing for the extension of the time for which said permit has been given, and fixing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Members of the City Council of Loup City, Nebraska:

**SECTION I**  
Any person, association of persons, or corporation, intending or proposing to erect or construct or build any building, whatsoever, within the corporate limits of said City of Loup City, Nebraska, from and after the passage, approval and publication of this ordinance, shall first apply to the City Clerk of said city, by application therefor, in writing, duly verified under oath, an application for a permit from the City Council of said city of Loup City, Nebraska, to erect, construct or build such building, in the following manner:

1st. By stating for whom said building is to be erected, constructed or built.

2nd. By describing the premises upon which said building is to be erected, constructed or built, by stating the number of the lots and block, or parts thereof, according to the recorded plat of said City of Loup City, Nebraska, of the office of the county clerk of the said county of Sherman.

3rd. By stating the dimensions of said building proposed, and the material of which said building is to be composed, and the dimensions and the thickness of walls of any cellar or basement story pertaining to or a part of said building, and the material to be used in the erection or construction thereof.

4th. By stating the intended purpose for which said building is to be used.

5th. By stating the time when said applicant intends to begin the construction, erection or building of said building, and the time which the same is expected to be completed.

Said application shall be filed with the city clerk of said city, and at the next meeting thereafter of the city council of Loup City, Nebraska, said city council shall consider the same, and if said application be considered reasonable and in good faith, said council shall direct the city clerk to issue to said applicant a builder's permit to so erect, construct and build said building as in said application described.

**SECTION III**  
This further provided that if any such applicant is for good cause, unable to complete such building within the time stated in said application and permit, said city council, upon sufficient showing, shall extend said time to said council shall seem just and reasonable.

**SECTION IV**  
Any person, association of persons, or corporation, found guilty of any violation of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00 for each day of default in the preparation, construction and building of said building, or the cellar or basement story thereof.

**SECTION V**  
This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

## Ordinance No. 90

An Ordinance describing, declaring and fixing the fire limits in the city of Loup City, Sherman county, Nebraska, and providing for the building of buildings therein, and fixing a penalty for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Loup City, Nebraska:

**SECTION I**  
The following described territory, to-wit: West half (½) of block number three (3); all of blocks numbered five (5), six (6), seventeen (17), eighteen (18) and nineteen (19), of the Original Town, now City of Loup City, Nebraska; and the south half (½) of block number thirteen (13), in Laik & Kreichbaum's addition to the original town, all according to the recorded plat of said Loup City, Nebraska, of record in the office of the county clerk of said county, shall be embraced in, and hereby is declared and constituted the Fire Limits of the City of Loup City, Nebraska.

**SECTION II**  
It is hereby made unlawful for any person, association of persons, or corporation, to build, erect, or construct any building within and constructed of brick, stone, cement or other incombustible material.

**SECTION III**  
Any person, association of persons, or corporation, found guilty of any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00), nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00).

**SECTION IV**  
This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
