TO SUBSCRIBERS

On and after March 1, 1912, the Northwestern will be \$1.50 per year. At the advanced cost of print paper, the present rate of \$1 per year represents loss instead of profit. In the meantime the rate will remain the same to all, old and new readers--\$1 per year, in advance.

Notice to Subscribers

After Jan. 1, 1912, we shall require all subscriptions on our single list to be paid in advance, unless guaranteed by our home people. We are now sending upwards of 200 papers in single wrappers to almost every state in the union, and we find as a common rule that little attention is paid to the date to which their paper is paid, and too often, after the paper has been taken for a period beyond we are notified to stop same, either by postmaster or subscriber without remittance of amount due. Hence cash in advance will be our motto on all single wrappers.

Gov. Aldrich has filed his candidacy for renomination and election as chief executive and it is hardly probable that he will have any opposition on the republican side, although the Taft contingent does not feel very kindly disposed toward him for his stand in favor of La Follette.

Col. Watterston of the Louisville Courier Journal is recorded as saying that "If Roosevelt is put in the White House in 1912, we will never get him out again except feet first." Wonder if the Kentucky colonel expects Teddy to meet the fate of Lincoln, Ga. field, and McKinley?

Judge Norris proposes introducing a bill in congress after the holidays placing all postal employees under civil service rules and to reduce the salaries of all postmasters now receiving in excess of \$2,000 per year. If the reform worm has imbedded itself in the judge's epidermis to stay, would it not be in order for him to take a little whack at the salary of his official peers and reduce his and their salary accordingly. It is a poor rule that will work reform on the other fellow only. As the judge is a candidate for U. S. senator, he might make a ten-strike by proposing a cut that will effect his own salary, in event of his election.

"Maryland, My Maryland" seems to be trying to find some new way to settle the negro question. Last Saturday a mob took a negro from jail after his arrest for killing a white man, and chopped him to pieces with hatchets. Even that is more merciful than death by burning at the stake as is the custom in the southern states.

Senator Norris Brown will again make the race for the U. S. senatorship. There seems to be no special reason that can be urged for the elimination of the present Norris in the upper house of congress and the substitution of the other Norris. The word "Reform" means too often "Put the other fellow out, I want in," as the only argument.

The Loup City, (Neb.) Northwestern published by the editor's brother J. W. Burleigh, announced last week that the subscription price would be raised from \$1 to \$1.50, commencing March 1st, 1912. That certainly is a move in the right direction. All magazines and most newspapers have advanced the subscription price to meet the increased cost of everything the printer has to eat.—Tingely Iowa Vindicator.

One John Yeisar of Omaha has filed a petition to place Roosevelt on the primary ballot in Nebraska as a candidate for president. Of course the La Follette leaders are yelling that his coming out is at the instance of the Taftites, who are bringing him forward to assist Taft at the expense of the Wisconsin statesman, and credit young Roosevelt as being the republican Santa Claus that hung up the Roosevelt political stocking.

Democratic office seekers are getting busy. The senatorial plum looks very tempting to ex-Gov. Shallenberger and so he filed Christmas day as a candidate for election to the U. S. senate, to compete with "Little Giant" Thompson of Grand Island, who "agin or yit" bids up for that office in perennial hunt for some office. Besides these two, Chris Gruenther, the Platte river statesman from Columbus, has had a petition gotten up in his interest for the same office, and goes one better by having another petition out and signed for him as a candidate for governor. Besides the above we hear of several other democratic pie-hunters who are likely to file either for governor or for the U. S. senate at an early day.
