He came west and located at Broken Bow, when 16 years of age, where he resided until February 1897, when he came to Loup City. He learned the jewelers trade and set up a business for himself in Loup City, before he led his bride to the altar. "Shep" as he was familiarly known, was a favorite with every body.
