Notes From Onlooker.

The people of Ashton paid their respects to our late beloved president William McKinley last Thursday when promptly at 1:30 p. m. the column of parade was formed on main street in front of the Modern Woodmen hall and carried out the line of march and program in the following pre-arranged order:

Coinrads of the G. A. R. with colors reefed and heavily craped, followed by guard of honor with arms port in command of Sarger t Grobrish of Company E., First Nebraska Infantry, Woodmen, townsmen, visitors and children from all the departments of Ashton public schools with teachers in charge took up the line of march down main street and to the corner of first and main streets. Here the head of the column filed right and while the bells from every spire in the village tolled solemn peals the procession in two files passed into the Presbyterian church. packing it from front to enterance.

The order of service began by singing the old familiar hymn "Near'er My God to Thee followed by the reading of President Roosevelt's proclamation by Rev. Humphrey. an invocation by Elder Olinger, a visiting Clergyman from lowa. The singing of the hymn "We Will Understand" was followed by prayer by Rev. Humphrey and the choir sang "Lead Kindly light."

After the reading of the scripture by Rev. Hamphery from the 90th Psalm Elder O'inger delivered the address, and for one hour sweet and precious utterances of love and praise fell from his lips in eulogising the life of our fallen chief.
