Here the head of the column fled right and while the bells from every spire in the village tolled solemn peals the procession in two files passed into the Presbyterian church, packing it from front to entrance. The order of service began by singing the old familiar hymn "Nearer My God to Thee" followed by the reading of President Roosevelt's proclamation by Rev. Humphrey, an invocation by Elder Olinger, a visiting Clergyman from Iowa. The singing of the hymn "We Will Understand" was followed by prayer by Rev. Humphrey and the choir sang "Lead Kindly Light." After the reading of the scripture by Rev. Humphrey from the 9th Psalm, Elder Olinger delivered the address, and for one hour sweet and precious utterances of love and praise fell from his lips in eulogizing the life of our fallen chief. The services at the church were concluded by all singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee," and after the benediction was pronounced the guard filed on followed by the audience. A hollow square was formed around the bier of the dead president when the burial was read by Rev. Humphrey. Then the guard advanced and with arms at a present all comrades saluted the dead, then a salute of eighteen guns was fired by the guard

of honor as a mark of military respect and honor to the departed commander in chief. Then the Bugler advanced at the foot of the bier and blew those solemn notes, "Good bye, good bye." These are known in the service as taps. And so ends the exercises of the day. Solemn and impressive, sad, yet pleasing an object lesson for young and many of the older ones that will remember all the rest of their lives. Pursuant to adjournment of July 10th, 1901, the County Board of Supervisors met according to law at the court house in Loup City, members present being W. C. Dietrichs chairman, Peter Thode, D. H. Richardson, Lewis Bechtold, Anton Kwiatkowski, John Boecking and J. F. Roberts supervisors, and John Minshull clerk and the following proceedings were had and done, to-wit: Minutes of last meeting were on motion read and approved as read. In the matter of the petition for a bridge across Oak creek on the section line between sections 26 and 27 township 15, range 13, as prayed for by H. Smelser and others. It was on motion ordered that the same be indefinitely postponed. In the matter of the consent road petitioned for by Samuel S. Chilson and others, praying that a road be established the Board does find that said road is a public necessity and on motion the petition is granted and said road is established as prayed. The official bonds of Wm. Canton as overseer of highways Dist. No. 20 and John Daddow as overseer of highways Dist. No. 22, were on motion approved. On motion the county treasurer is hereby authorized to invest the funds belonging to the county bond sinking fund in his hands, in warrants of the different school districts and townships of this county, as provided in sections 14 and 15 of chapter 33, Compiled Statutes of Nebraska for 1901. In the matter of the petition for the establishment of a road as prayed for by E. G. Taylor and others, the reconstrator of Fred Rein and others is disallowed and the petition granted and said road established as prayed. Board adjourned to 9 o'clock a. m., Sept. 10, 1901. Sept. 10, 1901.—Board in session pursuant to adjournment; all members present with clerk and county attorney. Before the Board appeared T. L. Pilger and requested that the taxes assessed against him in Webster township for the year 1899 be stricken from the tax list of said year for the reason that the property so assessed was the identical property assessed to him in Loup City township for said year and on motion the clerk is ordered to strike said tax from the tax list of Webster tp for said year. On motion the following resolution was adopted: It appearing to the County Board that the public road commencing at Kearney Road at or near the quarter stake between sections 11 and 14, in township 13, range 16 and terminating at Bloody Run Road, at or near quarter stake between sections 10 and 15 in township 13 range 15, in Sherman county, Nebraska, has been erroneously numbered 41 on Road Record No. 1, and on Plat Book No. 1 and it further appearing to the Board that the said public road has been petitioned for, ordered surveyed, established and platted, and has been used and occupied as a public road for about fifteen years and a public bridge erected thereon about ten years since, and that said road has never been vacated. It is further considered and ordered by the Board that said road be numbered 041 and the clerk change the number thereof on Road Record No. 1 at page 57 thereof, and on Plat Books Nos. 1 and 2, and make proper reference on said records to said order, and the several road overseers on the line of said road do open up and work the same. It appearing to the Board that a number of the persons selected at the January meeting possessing the qualifications of jurors have removed from the county and therefore the necessary number are not forthcoming, the said action of the County Board selecting them as jurors for the next jury term of the District Court is on motion hereby rescinded.
