The Times-Independent, among its numerous foolish questions, ask us why Mr. Pearson did not use that \$22,000.00 to pay off warrants, etc. Probably for the same reason that the present county treasurer has about the same amount on hand now, and very likely for the same reason that all of the county treasurers generally show a balance on hand of from \$30,000.00 to \$35,000.00 at every settlement, both annual and semi-annual. These balances are paid out as circumstance direct. Part of it may have belonged to the state, some to school districts. Some of it may have belonged to the interest bond fund, and at the proper time would have been paid out for that purpose. Exactly the same conditions regarding the balance on hand prevail now. \$22,000.00 or thereabouts on hand and the county treasurer informs us that no bonds are likely to be paid off now. The money doubtless belongs to other funds and at the proper time must be so disbursed, in other words it is on hand for other purposes. Can you see the point Brother Brown.

**LETTER FROM THE NAVY.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, CAL Dec. 4,  
DEAR FATHER AND ALL AT HOME,  
I take pleasure in again dropping you a few lines to let you know that I am well and hope you are all the same at home. There was a terrible explosion of a powder mill at Berkeley, just across the bay, a few min-

utes ago. We were looking out the window when it occurred. There were two explosions but we have not yet heard the cause. We had just been looking at the mills when the first explosion came and when we looked more than half of them seemed to be gone and then the second one came and destroyed the balance. The same thing occurred three years ago. The French cruiser Guiera came in today and they fired a national salute of 21 guns and the fort at the Golden Gate answered it.

We are getting along fine and having a nice time. I received the papers you sent to-day.

The swimming tank will soon be done, the pump house is done and the condenser is in. The water will come from the bay and the pump will be run by electricity. The new dock is also under way. There was one of the heaviest fogs on the bay the other night that was ever experienced here. Two ferry boats collided at Alcatraz island, and it is not certain how many lives were lost. The captains of the boats said they could not see 50 yards ahead. A train also run into an obstruction during the fog and was derailed in Oakland. Also on the same night a heavily veiled lady boarded the ferry boat Piedmont, and after the boat was well clear of the dock, she jumped overboard and gave a loud scream as she went. Life boats were quickly lowered and a search made but she was not seen again.

Two deserters who came from the east were caught and are here now. The authorities here thought they had caught one of our apprentice boys that jumped some time ago, but when it came to identify him they could not do it and had to turn him loose. Captain Glass who was raised to a rear admiral last month has not got back yet but is expected soon. The captain of the French cruiser Guiera, is over to the Island to-day. Their sailors dress is all together different from ours. It rained all morning here and we had scrimishing in the hall. The Ranger took 15 landsmen from here last week. We cannot tell when we will get off on our cruise, it may be soon and it may be a long time yet as things change rapidly in the navy.

We expect quite a time on Christmas. We had a good time Thanksgiving, but it rained and spoiled our fun in the afternoon so we had our foot ball game on Friday. We are getting a great many games both in and out door, now that the winter is coming on and it will rain most of the time. Suppose you are having snow at home by this time, we will not likely see any snow here. Some of the boys claim that it began to snow here once and the ladies ran out and held their apron to catch it, and then it melted. Well I guess I must close for this time. Good bye.

**PUCKER UP AND WHISTLE.**
